

Joe George Hired to Coach SMA

Will Sound Call for Gridders Monday

Joseph George will head the athletic activities at St. Mary's academy in O'Neill during the 1952-'53 school term. Mr. George stated Wednesday the initial call for six-man grid candidates will be sounded Monday afternoon, August 25.

Mr. George, who received his master's degree from St. Xavier university, Cincinnati, O., in June of this year, also has contracted to teach science and literature at SMA. This will include world history, American history, democracy and American literature.

Sister M. Antonella, school principal, announced that the kindergarten will have a separate classroom. Thirty pupils have been enrolled in this class at the coming school year.

Mr. George took a course in football theory and participation at Wayne before entering the army during World War II.

Last week Mr. George attended the University of Nebraska coaching clinic. He is a member of the Nebraska Football Association and was tutored by Eddie Hickey of St. Louis "U" in cage classes.

The athletic department at the academy this year will be supported by the St. Mary's Athletic association, founded last week. L. D. Putnam is president; A. H. Doering, vice-president; George Hammond, secretary-treasurer.

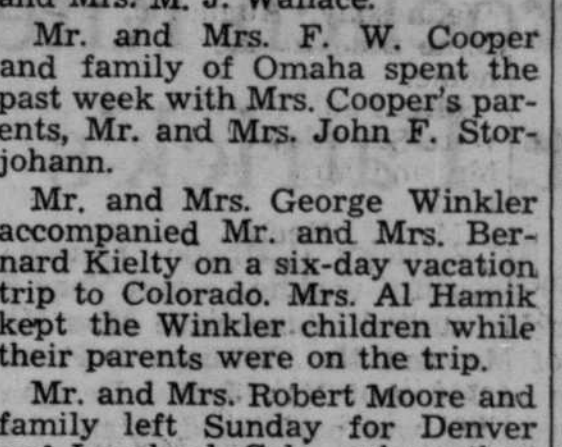


