

'Like Living in Fish Bowl' Explain Occupants Behind Picture Window

Along about this time of year sweet potatoes or their cousin, the yam, are mighty good eating. Did you know you can use dark corn syrup to candy yams? Here's how it's done:

Peel yams slice crosswise in 1/4 inch slices. Heat butter or margarine and shortening in a skillet and lightly brown sliced yams in the hot shortening. When all slices are browned, sprinkle with salt, pile all slices into skillet, pour corn syrup over the yams.

zill nuts, 3/4 cup granulated sugar, 1 1/2 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, one teaspoon baking powder. Sift these dry ingredients and add to fruit and nut mixture. Mix well. Last, add 4 well beaten eggs and 2 teaspoons vanilla. Mix well so egg mixture coats all the fruit and nuts. Place mixture in two well greased 8x11 wax paper lined loaf pans, 12 by 3 1/2 by 2 1/2 or regulation size bread pans. Bake in 200 degree oven two hours. To store, wrap in several thicknesses of waxed paper and one of aluminum foil. Store in a cool place.
