vision. James W. Rooney, O'Neill bus-inessman and member of the Tiobrara association board of directors, probably best summed up the reasons in support of Burdick's plan among the 27 who poke for it. Said Rooney:

"I am remembering the years 1932, 1934 and 1936—among the driest on record in our area. Down through the years the record shows that in 12 out of each 20 years north-central Nebraska needs supplemental moisture for

"Irrigation will help overcome this deficiency on 66,100 acres of land in the O'Neill - Emmet-Atkisnon area where now there are 353 farms. I predict the number of units will be increased to a minimum of 456 farms, figuring 160-acre units. (North Platte valley units average only 78 acres, however, for a comparison.)

"I predict there would be a 40 percent increase in crops annualor an annual increase of-3,900 tons of beef,

890 tons of pork,
155 tons of poultry,
4,920 tubs of butter,
35,920 cases of eggs.
"In addition," Mr. Rooney coninued, "irrigation would assure for this cattle country an abundance of feed and forage. In dry years we have to ship in forage. "Irrigation would help create an outlet for feeder cattle right here," he concluded.

Other speakers in support of the development plan pointed out increased production and increased population would follow, others stressed recreation advantages that would ac-
