Asked if Mr. Anderson had any hobbies, Mrs. Anderson answered for him:

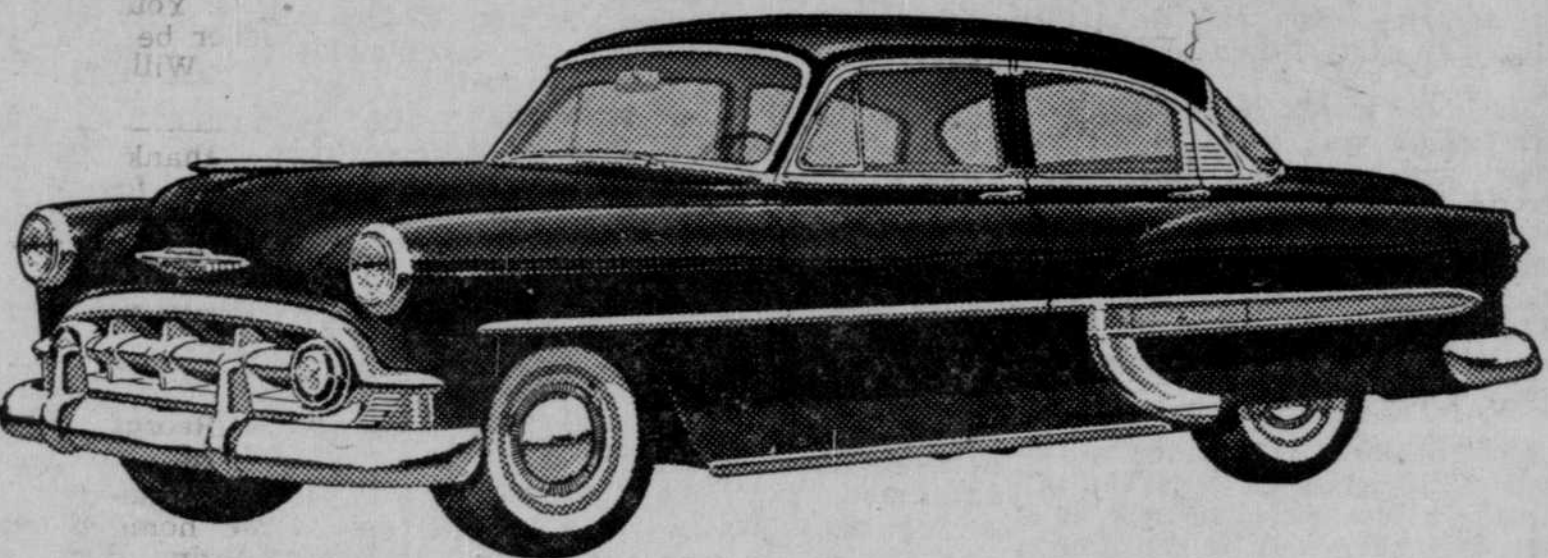
"Just work!" she quipped.
