Coach Paul Baker's O'Neill high Eagles became the Holt county cage champions for the second consecutive year by vanquishing a strong St. Joseph high team of Atkinson, 40-29, before a near-record throng of 1,300 persons on the O'Neill court. The tourney which opened Tuesday night, January 20, was climaxed Friday night.

The Page Eagles grabbed third place honors, defeating the Chambers Coyotes, 52 to 28. It was O'Neill Forward Jack Hollenbeck's corner fielders in the crucial moments and superiority at the free-throw lane that gave the crown to Baker's kids. Hollenbeck tallied 14 points. Big Gary Buckmaster, O'Neill center, got 13—mostly from under the basket. For St. Joe, Forward Don Gokie managed 11 points.

St. Joe finished the first period strong, surging to a 9-8 lead. Twice during the evening the Josies enjoyed one-point leads but they were short-lived.

The Bluejays clamped an air tight lid on the Eagles during the third period, the Eagles failing to get a fielder. But they hit eight out of 12 from the free-throw lane and stayed in front. O'Neill built a 21-13 halftime lead, accumulating 13 points in that stanza compared to five for the Josies.

O'Neill led 28-21 at the end of the third. Forward Davey Eby and Guard Bob Carroll turned in good floor games for the victors while St. Joe's Walt Ries was an offensive threat at the post throughout.

In the consolation game, Forward Ron Park scored 15 points for Page with his diminutive running mate, H. Troshynska, a frosh, stealing the affections of the crowd. Bernie Gribble, Chambers forward, produced 15 points for the Coyotes.
