### John W. Ressel, Long Ill, Dies

John W. Ressel, 88, a resident of O'Neill for the past four years, died Wednesday, January 28, in a Norfolk nursing home. He had suffered a lingering illness.

Funeral services were conducted Friday at Plainview.

The late John William Ressel, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Ressel, was born April 26, 1864, at Trenton, Ia.

In the year 1893, he came to Saunders county, Nebraska, with his parents, where he lived until 1919. On March 11, 1891, he was united in marriage to Fannie J. Boydston at Ithaca.

They lived on a farm near Ceresco until 1919, when they moved to Crawford Valley vicinity, near Plainview, where they resided until 1928, when they retired and moved into town at Plainview.

In August, 1952, Mr. Ressel underwent major surgery at a Norfolk hospital and since that time had been cared for at a nursing home there.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Ressel; a sister, Mrs. Henry Moyer; three brothers, Edgar, Phil and Charlie; also one son, Burtis.
