The directors, upon a recommendation of the Public Highways Committee, urged the State Highway Department to negotiate immediately for purchase of property along the proposed interstate highway route between 42nd and 48th near C Streets. It was mentioned that several commercial and residential developments are planned for this area. Such acquisition would enable owners in the area to fit their plans to

the route of the highway. The City of Omaha, upon the recommendation of the River Development Committee, was urged to appropriate sufficient funds to the Omaha Dock Board to enable it to complete the acquisition of a crane on an installment purchase contract and to make such repairs as may be necessary to keep the municipal dock functional for the coming navigation sea-

LB 470, as introduced, was opposed. Mi'ton Abrahams, chairman of the Education Committee. informed the Board that the bill would change the method of allocation of state educational funds to the individual school districts. At present such funds are allocated on the basis of total census of school pupils.

The bill, as introduced, would make the distribution on the basis of enrollment in public schools only. This would reduce the apportionment to the Omaha School District by about 20%, Abrahams said, and would have a serious effect on all school districts in Nebraska,

The meeting was concluded by a report on the Omaha Jubilee by V. J. Skutt, general chairman, and voted full support and cooperation in Omaha's Jubilee plans. The directors heard a suggestion made by the Jubilee Committee that a special exhibit of Omaha commercial and industrial activities be sponsored by the Chamber's Industry Committee.
