"My dear Senator: I have your letter of the 21st inst. (March.)

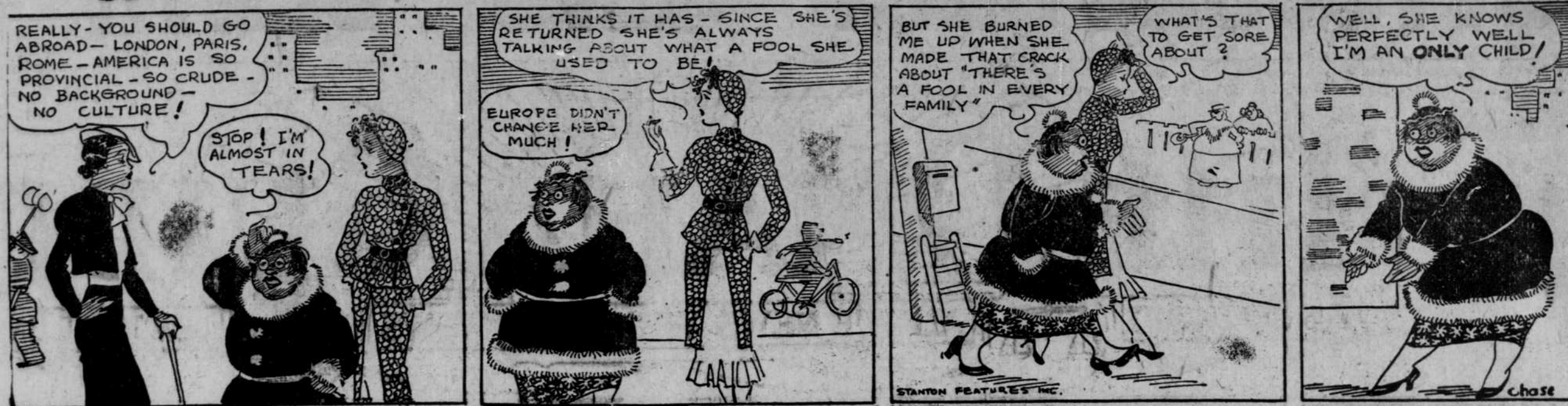
