Mrs. Lillie Smith, who was ill at the Lutheran hospital, returned to her home Thursday morning, 1702 1/2 No. 24th street.

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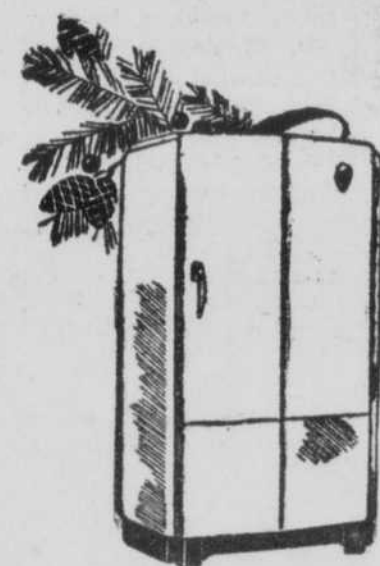
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
