Enlarged AAA Staff To Push Food Production

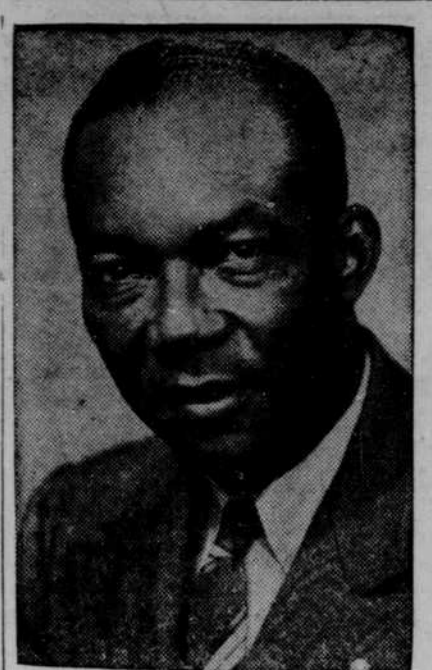
FOUR NEGRO FARM SPECIALISTS NAMED TO IMPORTANT AAA POSTS

Seeking to assure the achievement of this year's all-time high farm production goals, four state Agricultural Adjustment Agency offices each appointed a Negro contact representative last week to help Negro farmers further increase their output of vital war crops. C. D. Walker, director of the southern division of War Food Administration's AAA, announced.

The states in which the appointments were made are Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana and Texas. This makes a total of six states that now have full-time Negro AAA farm specialists. The other states are Mississippi and Oklahoma.

The new appointees are Henry W. Espy for Arkansas, J. O. Williams for Georgia, Joshua A. M. Lloyd, Louisiana and Colquitt D. Yancy, Texas. W. E. Ammons, and A. H. Fuhr for Mississippi and Oklahoma respectively were appointed last year. Other state offices may make similar appointments.

Dr. F. D. Patterson and Claude A. Barnett, special assistants to the secretary of Agriculture, who have discussed with AAA officials of all Southern states how the appointment of Negro contact representatives

could increase Negro farm production, said that these appointments are a major step toward reaching this year's food goals. They pointed out that these new AAA representatives will help Negro farmers in the four states to make greater use of conservation practices as a means of upping production.

Selected for their training and experience, these new contact representatives will organize instructional materials on the AAA program, and will also develop wide contacts with Negro county agents, vocational agriculture teachers, ministers and other community leaders. Through this established leadership, these contact men hope to encourage a large number of Negro farmers to more effectively join in AAA's program for conserving and building the soil, which in turn makes for increased production. These contact men will also help to assure the full participation of Negro farmers in all phases of the AAA program.

All of the appointees hold degrees in agriculture, and have made wide experiences either as teachers of vocational agriculture or county agents. Mr. Espy, who will serve on the AAA staff in Arkansas, was graduated from Tuskegee in 1936, and did graduate work at Prairie View State college in 1941. He has served as vocational agriculture teacher and county agent.

Mr. Lloyd, also a county agent at the time of his appointment to the AAA post, was graduated from Southern university in 1932. Before becoming a county agent in Louisiana, he was a vocational agriculture teacher.

Peth Mr. Williams and Mr. Yancy AAA contact men for Georgia and Texas respectively, were vocational agriculture teachers when named to their new positions. Mr. Williams is a graduate of Hampton institute and was teaching at H. A. Hunt high school, Fort Valley, Ga., Mr. Yancy is a graduate of Prairie View State college, and has done graduate work at Colorado state college. At the time of his appointment, Mr. Yancy was vocational agriculture teacher at New Summerfield, Texas.

CHARRED BODIES OF HOTEL FIRE VICTIMS REVEAL RACES CAN MIX

San Francisco, April 11 (ANP)—After the tragic New Amsterdam hotel fire recently, the story was told how white and colored lived peacefully together there as good neighbors, said Dr. Will W. Alexander, who in company with Dr. Edwin K. Embree and Dr. Charles S. Johnson came here to report on the results of a study of workers in the San Francisco Bay region, with special emphasis on in-migrant Negroes. Two Negroes and many whites are reported to have perished in that fire.

"White and Negro war workers were living in the same building with out any friction at the New Amsterdam hotel, I am told," said Dr. Alexander. "That's the way it is... in a great many instances relations between the races are so good that no one ever hears anything about it. It took this terrible fire to bring out the fact. Yet all over the northern and western parts of the United States we find that the races get along much better than the prophets of doom would have us believe.

In the New Amsterdam hotel fire, where white and colored lived together, more lives were lost than in any other San Francisco catastrophe, including the earthquake of 1906. Two colored residents are said to have perished.

Dr. Embree, who is president of the Julius Rosenwald fund, said that he had come here because he was interested in seeing a good pattern of race relations, a pattern in consonance with the American tradition of democracy, set up in the north and west where so many Negroes have moved and are doing excellent work in the war emergency. "We are pleased here there are people with vision in San Francisco sponsoring this survey, which Dr. Johnson has made," Dr. Embree said.

Dr. Johnson, a member of Fisk university faculty and one of the country's outstanding educators and authorities on race relations, was chosen to head a study of race relations here and was financed by an unnamed "citizen of San Francisco," said Mrs. Essie L. Maguire, executive secretary of the San Francisco YWCA.

Dr. Alexander is a director of the Rosenwald fund which has done much to improve race relations, and is chief of the minorities division of the War manpower commission. Dr. Alexander headed the Far Security administration for a number of years.

Dr. Johnson was the principal speaker at a public meeting in the Colonial room of the Hotel St. Francis Monday and on Tuesday morning spoke before the San Francisco Council of Churches at the Canterbury hotel.

Bachelor of Science, and may then be commissioned as ensigns in the Coast Guard.

The program for regular cadets has been shortened, as a result of the war, from four to three years by streamlining some courses and by adding an hour daily to the classroom studies.

The Academy grounds occupy a site of 45 acres on the west bank of the Thames River at New London, Conn., and the plant facilities, less than 10 years old, are unusually complete.

ry out my wishes; I am just an humble Negro, God-called Baptist preacher. I am trying to buy a home at 332 Vance avenue, and with God's help I am planning to stay there. I shall observe the laws of Memphis, respect white and colored, but I shall not live in fear.

"I feel safe in saying all white and colored who listened to A. Philip Randolph and other speakers at the First Baptist on Beale Friday night, March 31, left there with love, respect and goodwill for white and colored in Memphis, Tennessee, America and the world. A spirit of loyalty was reborn in every heart. Memphis shall see a spirit of love and not hate as the result of that meeting.

"The issue raised by Mr. Crump in Memphis is the issue around the world—Freedom. Thousands of my group are dying around the world for that freedom. If they can take it here, I can take it here, although I must take it unarmed, but the pity of it is that men should have to die there for what is denied here."

Controversy over Randolph's speech was heard from Crump's camp when Sheriff Oliver Perry, Crump henchman, took exception to the labor leader's remark that Crump "out-Hitlers Hitler."

"Had I known the Negro Randolph from New York City, and those he brought with him, were to make backguarding speeches defaming this community and speaking ill of my friends, Mr. Hale and Mr. Crump, I would have pulled them all out of the pulpit in Preacher Long's Beale St. church," Perry said.

"Freedom of speech doesn't give anyone the license to lie and incite riots, and that is what they were doing," the Crump sheriff charged. He threatened to be on hand when the

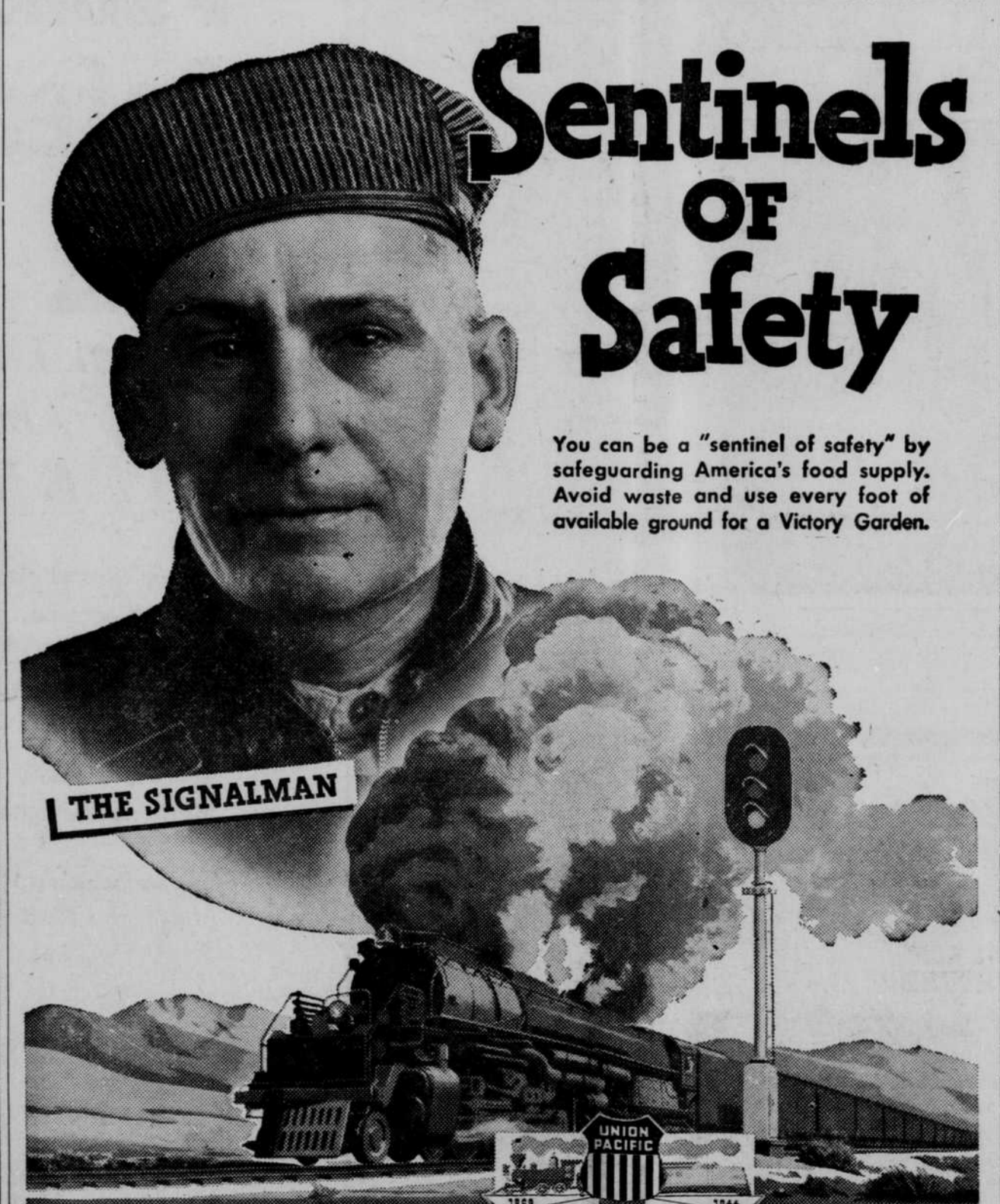
