Two golf presidents is all right for raising money and that sort of stuff, but what about them championship cups. Why not build up some competitive enthusiasm. With all of them big meetings

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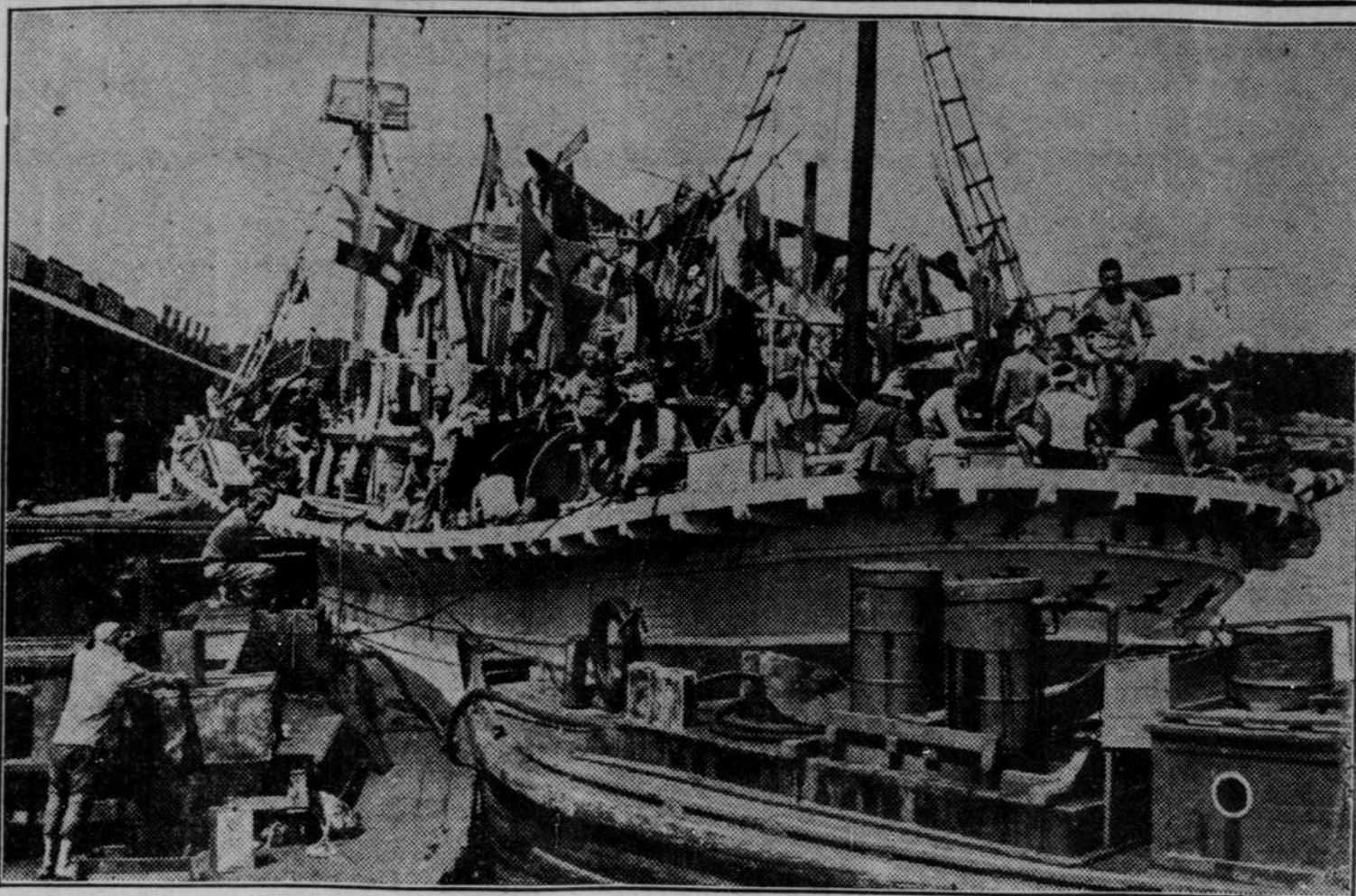
