Of the maximum freight bill General Manager Holdrege of the Burlington says: "The farmers of Nebraska have said that it was a just measure. We shall see whether it is or not by allowing it to become a law. Under the construction of the supreme court the bill will not go into effect until August 1, and by that time the tariffs can be made looking to its enforcement."

It seems that the Burlington's restless untiring ambition to build will never cease. The telegraph of Wednesday announces that work is about to be commenced and the line pushed still farther northwest from Sheridan, and that ere many months the Burlington will be a daily visitor to Northern Pacific points. The report also states that work is to be kept up until the famous Puget sound is reached, and either, or both, Tacoma and Seattle are shown as Burlington towns.

Chauncy M. Depew's frank admission that the rates to the world's fair are too high and will be reduced is something new, coming from a railroad manager. The average official is afraid to take the public into his confidence, and the result is neither is satisfactory to the roads nor the people. If the managers would be candid at all times in discussing that part of the railroad business in which the public has a right to make inquiry the result would be beneficial to all parties concerned.

There will be another excursion run to Sheridan, Wyoming, from several Nebraska towns July 1st.
