George Cowman and wife, who had been visiting the former's brother, Dave, returned to their home in St. Louis Tuesday.

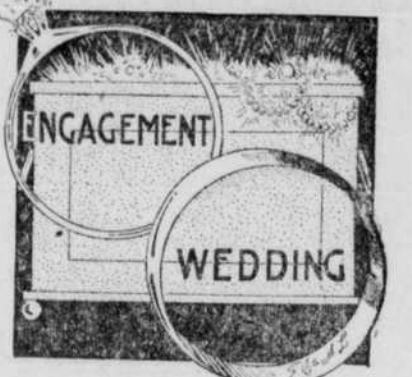
During the storm Thursday evening, while at work at the dredge boat, Tod Drake was struck by lightning and seriously injured.
