Now the treat of a pear, some candy, dried perismmons; peanuts, a little white flour or rice (great luxuries) and possibly a litle meat, with a turnip and some carrots, the whole enlivened by a bright picture card, is distributed to each patient in the Hospital. Their gratitude knows no bounds. What motive is it that could prompt a person of alien race, a stranger, not only to treat their diseases-though loathsome—and to get up to upon them at night, but also prompt him to give them to eat what they never can afford to have except at the great festival of the Chinese New Year? It is inconceivable. They do not try to solvee the riddle, but happily accept the great blessing. However, they, too, learn why all the world should give-and yet grow rich in giving-on Christmas Day!

Next we are off to the Girls' school. Within the enclosure stands rows of girls, each receiving and holding her treat of nuts, fruit and candy in the skirt of her upper garment. Off they scamper, to return care-free, and then the games begin.
