This morning's mail brought some very interesting letters which reveal some of the work we camp pastors are called upon to perform.

One Pastor wrote telling of a young one from his parish who has not been confirmed, but who is anxious to unite with the Church before he leaves for France.

A Card came from a woman in Minnesota asking me to try to locate her brother. She has lost track of him and appeals to me to ascertain whether or not he is here.

A pastor tells me of two of his boys who have secretly reached the camp. He himself desires to visit here after Easter and asks me to give him advice as to how to make the most of a contemplated visit.

A camp paper was received from one of our boys at Gordon with a marked article nothing an appointment of Dr. Schaeffer as Camp Pastor there.

The other day I was talking to one of our boys. He was proud to tell me that he had been working with the men of his company and had gotten "from 6 to 10" men to promise to attend service with him.

The fact that the Church has raised more than the \$750,000 asked makes a tremendous impression upon the boys. One said the other day "It's fine to know that the Church has not forgotten us and has proved it by the success of the campaign."

A few experiences at the Camp Dodge base hospital might be of interest to the reading public. A young man in the pneumonia ward, waiting for the death angel to come, stopped me and said, "Who are you?" Learning that I was a minister, he exclaimed, "Talk to me, please."

A Lutheran boy from North Dakota died from pneumonia a few days ago. Lutheran army pastors from the Brotherhood building visited him almost every day for three weeks. Being asked one day if he prayed, he said, "Yes, I ask the Lord if there is room for me."

Upon his deathbed a colored soldier said to one of the army pastors, after he had offered up a short prayer, "God bless you, God be with you." Those words came from the heart and the pastor will never forget the blessing coming from the lips of the darky.

Another colored man at the hospital was reading his testament, and being told it was a good book, he said, "It sure ain a good book—we must trust in the Lord." It is our prayer that the white soldier may get more of the childlike faith of the darky.

A Lutheran boy in the rheumatic ward, reading his testament, was asked if he made it a practise to read the Bible every day. He answered by saying that every day he read the Scriptures and said his prayers.

It will interest you to know that our recreation room is finished and I am more than pleased with the outcome. It contains the following: seating capacity of three hundred and twenty-five, wall tables for writing, stationery, ink and pens furnished, a piano loaned by a Lieutenant who entertains the men almost every evening.

Chester and myself have combined for a great Holy Week and Easter service. Enclosed find a program to be used in Chester's regiment where I assist and in my regiment where two other

regiments will be combined. The workers of the 51st and 52nd were so pleased with our plans that suggestions have gone out that it be used throughout the Camp. The result is that large playcards are being posted throughout these three regiments with the subjects mentioned.

On the other hand I was concerned that our men should have an opportunity of having a real Easter service on Easter morning. I interviewed the manager of the largest theatre in the center of the Park, seating about three thousand people in which there is a large pipe organ and plenty of stage room.

I have written this in detail because I wanted you to know that this is one of the big opportunities that we have taken hold of and we feel, that likely we have won out and put a stamp on the whole services of Holy Week; for the Y. M. C. A. Headquarters, in the Park, accepted the suggestion made by the men who consulted me and they expect to work out the same in every building.
