**"PREACH THE WORD."****Opening Sermon at the Annual Meeting of Joint Conference of Lutheran Missions in Japan.**(By J. P. Nielsen.)  
(Continued from last issue.)

The Buddhists have imitated our S. S., built modern "Chapels" in some places and are now appearing us in doing street preaching, even to the extent of hanging up a big lantern written on in large characters. In a certain sense they yet have the power and the people, and sometimes when we hear about their large S. S. and other activities, we feel a little quivering about the heart. But we never want to forget that they have no Word for the people and especially for the little children. We want ever to remember that no lasting results can be attained through mere forms and counterfeits. Above all we must ever keep in mind that the Word we preach is the word of God's eternal power, and therefore it is up to us to place ourselves firmly upon this Word. "For it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth." After hearing certain forms of preaching, Christian so called, people have been known to exclaim: "its all the same," meaning that there is no difference between our message and that of Buddhism. If we preach in that way, we are surely not preaching the Word, but dragging the "eternal Gospel" down into the mire of human philosophy and common morality. How dare any Christian preacher present the Gospel in such a way that it appears as nothing distinct or extraordinary!

A book like the Bible could not by all the ingenuity of all great minds be constructed out of all the religious literature of heathendom. Nor can anything resembling the Christian God be conceived by mere human thought. There is no other religion in the world with a crucified and risen Savior. The whole world celebrates Christmas, but how many think about Good Friday! Yet Calvary, and not Bethlehem, is the center of our Christian religion. It is at the foot of the cross, and not at the manger, that a sinner finds forgiveness of sins. Our great message to the world is, that Christ died for sinners that they might live. What the Japanese need is not more moral precepts but real self-conquering power. What they need is not only a "Golden Rule", but a regenerate heart and the power of the Holy Ghost. Their word of which Christ said: "The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and are life."

A Japanese pastor of one of the leading churches in Japan recently lectured to a gathering of Japanese Christians on Genesis in which this book was broken up into many pieces and then jumbled together in the four scrap-heaps of E. J. D. P., which four symbols might fittingly be read: Effrontery, Jangling, Death Perdition and placed as an epitaph on the tomb of all such theologians. On the same occasion the story of the Fall was taken as an old fairy tale. Another lecture at the same meeting lectured on Philippians, but could see nothing of Christ's divinity in that epistle. Our Christians hear too much of this kind of talk and too little of the living Word of God.

When we insist on the preaching of the Word, we are not fighting a spectre, but powers clothed in flesh and blood. We are up against powers which would rob Christ of His divinity, the Cross of its power, the Word of its distinctive truth, and men and women of their heaven-sent salvation. We are up against a form of Christianity which, holding the form of godliness, but having denied the power thereof, is only another form of heathendom. We have undoubtedly all often felt this, but let us, in view of the times, give still more diligence to our high calling to preach the Word of God's power. Only in this way shall we ever be able to say what Paul said to the elders from Ephesus: "I am pure from the blood of all men." This he could say because it could truly be said of him while he was in Ephesus that he was "reasoning daily in the school of Tyrannus. And this continued for the space of two years; so that all they that dwelt in Asia heard the Word, both Jews and Greeks." And because he could say without fear of contradiction that he had been "testifying both to Jews and Greeks" repentance toward God, and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ. Unless we do this and do it unceasingly we need look for nothing but regrets and an evil conscience when all is over.
