Leland Stanford, president of the Southern Pacific railroad, does not take as kindly to the interstate commerce bill as Charles Francis Adams, the president of the Union Pacific does. The latter considers it a good thing; the former has not as yet been convinced on that point. The other day Stanford presented a very strong case in support of his belief on the bill. In his paper to the commission he enumerated the several competing transportation routes from Asia to this country, and from the Pacific across this continent. He represented that a suspension or material modification of the long and short haul clause of the law will be necessary to facilitate business. He wants an immediate ruling, or a suspension of that clause till an examination and ruling can be made. He says that ships are now in transit from China and Japan with cargoes destined mostly for points east of the Rocky Mountains, and unless the rights of competition are maintained it will be impossible to carry out contracts. It would seem that contracts made before the law went into operation should be valid and respected as such.—E.
