PROCEEDINGS OF THE REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION. The Republican County Convention assembled at the court house last Saturday and was called to order promptly at two o'clock by Chairman Nesbitt who read the call and made some suitable remarks...

H. M. Grimes was elected temporary chairman and A. A. Pangborn of Brady Island temporary secretary. On motion of Sid D. Robb the following committee on credentials was appointed: Sid D. Robb, D. W. Besack, Wm. Woodhurst, W. H. Dudley and C. E. Osgood.

Your committee on credentials would respectfully report that they find the following named gentlemen duly elected delegates to this convention from their respective precincts: North Platte—First Ward, Jos. Schamp, Alex. England proxy; C. H. Stamp, T. C. Patterson, John Hawley, D. W. Besack, E. B. Warner...

Griswold proxy, J. G. Beeler, J. H. Jordan, W. B. Hatcher. Osgood—C. E. Osgood. Brady Island—A. A. Pangborn, R. D. Fisher. Mr. Fisher being prevented by sickness from attending the convention your committee recommends that Mr. Pangborn be allowed to cast the vote for his delegation.

O'Fallon—W. H. Dudley. Nowell—Sid D. Robb. Nichols—T. J. Stimson. Sunshine, Mylander and Fairview precincts not being represented and there being residents of those precincts present, we recommend that G. C. Campbell be allowed to represent Mylander, E. L. Howell for Fairview and Charles Richards for Sunshine.

The report of the committee was adopted. On motion the following gentlemen were admitted to represent their respective precincts: Wm. Hubart from Hall, J. J. O'Rourke from Cottonwood, G. E. French from First Ward, W. T. Wilcox from Second ward.

On motion the temporary organization was made permanent. T. C. Patterson moved that a committee of five to select delegates to attend the congressional district and state conventions be appointed. From a viva voce vote the chair was unable to decide, and a division resulted in the loss of the motion.

The following named gentlemen having received the highest number of votes were declared duly elected. H. M. Grimes, E. B. Warner, P. L. Harper, John Keith, J. E. Evans, Wm. Woodhurst, A. A. Pangborn, J. W. Bixler.

A ballot was then taken for delegates to the congressional convention resulting in the election of A. D. Buckworth, C. E. Osgood, M. Oberst, James Beeler, J. I. Nesbitt, W. T. Wilcox, C. F. Iddings, J. S. Hoagland.

By permission, J. I. Nesbitt, chairman of the Republican county committee presented the following resolutions: Resolved, By the Republican party of Lincoln County, Nebraska, First, We reaffirm and endorse the principles of the Republican party as developed and wrought into the history of this nation during the past twenty-five years.

Second, That we demand a free ballot and a fair count; that the fraud and coercion practiced in the state of Louisiana at the late election is a menace to free government and a dishonor to the principles of freedom and liberty that demands rebuke.

Third, That we demand protection for labor, encouragement for commerce, dispatch in the transaction of government business and a fair opportunity to fulfill the requirements of law in regard to timber culture, homestead and pre-emption rights granted by congress to the citizens of the northwest in common with the entire country.

Mr. Nesbitt's wish was done. Wherupon the convention adjourned. H. M. Grimes, Chairman. A. A. PANGBORN, Secretary.
