Cleveland's majority over Blaine in the State of New York was only 1,047 votes.

The opinion of Prince Bismarck regarding the tariff question is interesting. In a speech before the reichstag he said: "The success of the United States in material development is the most illustrious of modern time. The American nation has not only successfully borne and suppressed the most gigantic war of all history, but immediately afterward disbanded its army, found work for all its soldiers and marines paid off most of its debt, given labor and homes to all the unemployed Europe as fast as they could arrive within its territory, and still by a system of taxation so indirect as not to be perceived, much less felt. Because it is my deliberate judgment that the prosperity of America is mainly due to its system of protective laws, I urge that Germany has now reached that point where it is necessary to imitate the tariff system of the United States."
