CHICAGO, Ill., July 22.--About five hundred men, representing engineers, firemen, brakemen and switchmen of the roads running out of Chicago, held a meeting to-day for the purpose of taking political action on questions of interest to the order. It was claimed that the meeting represented about thirty thousand voters in the state, and would therefore hold the balance of power so far as legislation is concerned. A club was formed which will have for its battle cry the repeal of the Merritt conspiracy law and a more strict enforcement of the private detective law against the Pinkertons. A committee of five was appointed to take charge of the campaign and act as a control body, from which all directions are to emanate.

It is not a little remarkable that Joe Fifer, the republican candidate for governor of Illinois, came out of the war a humble private and has never since received a military title. He is simply private Fifer yet, so far as military distinction goes. But as the embodiment of the great patriotism, intelligence and bravery of the vast majority of the army, he is held in great love and veneration, and in civil life he is destined to achieve higher honors than the soldiers who wore shoulder straps.

Then, too, the antagonism in the Democratic ranks, by which General Mar maduke's majority for governor was reduced to 400 votes, is still going on. It is the rebellion of the old Union Democrats against Bourbon Democratic rule.

In the year 1890 the Mormons had four missionaries in Scandinavian countries, who in that year made 135 converts, of whom seventeen emigrated to Utah. During the thirty-two years following the total number of converts was 132,776, of whom 21,000 emigrated to Utah. In 1891 there were sixty-one missionaries in the field. The average yearly number of converts for thirty-two years was 4,149. The number of Scandinavian Mormons now in Utah, according to best authorities, is between thirty and forty thousand. Most of them have come from Denmark. Sweden and Norway have sent about equal numbers.
