THE U. S. COURT BILL PASSED.

Omaha, Lincoln, Hastings and Norfolk the Points Named.

The bill providing for the terms of the United States district and circuit courts at additional points in Nebraska was reported from the conference committee and passed on Monday. The house receded from its disagreement to the senate amendment striking out Kearney, and the bill, as it will become a law, will provide that terms of the courts shall be held at Omaha, Lincoln, Norfolk and Hastings.

A Washington dispatch says: It required a great deal of effort to convince the senate that Norfolk and Hastings should be added to Omaha and Lincoln for terms of the courts. Judge Dundy did a great deal towards prejudicing the senate committee on judiciary against the proposition and some members of the senate committee referred to the application of the Nebraskaans for an increase of terms as "putting the court on wheels."

usual and the general was at times a little restless, but appeared generally bright and cheerful to-day. His voice was strong. He took a full supply of nourishment, slept occasionally as usual, and the doctors and his family were in hopeful spirits. At 7 o'clock Mrs. Sheridan went to the hotel for supper, and soon after her return the usual preparations for the night were made. At about 9:20 Colonel Sheridan said "good night" to his brother, and went to the hotel, there having been through the day no sign whatever of any unfavorable change in his condition. At 9:30 symptoms of heart failure suddenly appeared, and Dr. O'Reilly and Matthews, who were with him at the time, immediately applied the remedies which proved successful in all similar previous attacks, but this time they were without effect, and despite all that could be done the general gradually sank into a condition of complete unconsciousness, and at 10:20 breathed his last. Mrs. Sheridan, the Sisters Mabon and Justinian, and the faithful body servant, were also at his bedside throughout his dying hour. Gen. Sheridan was 57 years old.
