THE APPOINTMENT.

The several counties are entitled to representation as follows, being based upon the vote cast for Hon. Geo. H. Hastings for attorney-general in 1890.

APPOINTMENT. The several precincts are entitled to representation as follows, being based upon the vote cast for Hon. Geo. H. Hastings for attorney-general in 1890.
