Light on the Light Question. Editor TRIBUNE:—I wish to place before your readers some facts and figures relating to lighting cities by electricity which may be serviceable. The following tables are compiled from a government report on gas and electric lighting and published in the Review of Railways. The Review says: "Although it has been less than six years since the field of electric lighting was first entered by municipalities, more than 125 cities in the United States now own and operate plants. The movement has not been a local one. It has extended across the country from Bangor, Me., to Galveston, Texas. So far this movement has been confined chiefly to the smaller cities, but the larger cities are beginning to discover that the element of size is not necessarily a bar to their entrance upon the same course."
