POWDERLY to Cleveland: "When you were elected this country was enjoying an era of prosperity. Trade and commerce flourished, manufacturers were hopeful for the future. For once in the history of the nation the cry of overproduction was not heard, and so far as statistics go those engaged in manufacturing pursuits were working on orders and had no stock ahead to threaten labor with fear of dismissal."

THE Grave Question of Immigration. Henry Cabot Lodge, reviewing some census statistics in the September number of Scribner's, quotes these figures relative to the white population of the whole country in 1890:

OF native percentage... OF foreign birth... That is to say, 62 per cent of the people living in America in 1890 were born in America of parents who had been born in America, 21 per cent were born in America of parents who were born outside of America, and 17 per cent were born outside of America of parents who were born outside of America.

convicts in the penitentiaries 48 per cent are of native parentage; 52 per cent are of foreign birth of foreign parentage; so that while the persons of foreign birth or of foreign parentage are a little more than one-third of the whole population, they are more than half the population in penitentiaries.

But it is worthy of special note that while 59 per cent of the paupers of the country are of foreign birth or parentage, only 3 per cent of them are of American birth. More than half of all the paupers in the United States were born abroad.

It is not time to put an end to the influx of lazzaroni and proletarians that burden our cities with disease and crime, and who, while lessening the wages of our native born, become yearly an increasing tax upon the public and private charities of the country?—Chicago Inter-Ocean.

THE foreign-born population—directly imported from the old world—furnishes about a sixth of our population, and more than half of our paupers. Is there not imperative need of instant restriction of immigration? We know by sad experience that by far the greater part of the dangerously criminal population of Chicago is of foreign birth.

To immigrants with good health, good sense, and good morals this country will always give welcome. There is room for the Teuton, the Celt and the Slav and the Scandinavian who hastens from the seaboard to the frontier farm and becomes a pioneer of civilization.
