Names are not placed on the pension roll without systematic investigation by men trained to the work of analyzing evidence, and having no personal or pecuniary interest in the matter. When a case has been passed upon it implies that all of the facts have been fully considered, and that the claim comes within the provisions of the law. There is little or no dicretion left to the officials of the pension office. They are required to observe the terms of plain and specific acts of congress, and to insist upon fixed forms of proof, which must appear in the record. It is not at all likely that under such conditions any considerable number of fraudulent claims have been allowed.


