The Republican Rally
Thursday Night

The republican rally at Nemaha
was a grand success. The opera house
was crowded including the gallery and
and the people stayed until the meet-
ing was over. On account of the pres-
ence of C. F. Reavis the county candi-
dates spoke very briefly. Those pres-
ent were D. J. A. Dirks, C. R. Hacker,
Abe Lawrence, W. M. Crichton, Geo.
Carrington, E. J. Maxwell, W. A. Doo-
little and Ben Parker, candidates res-
pectively for treasurer, clerk, sheriff,
judge, superintendent, assessor, com-
missioner and surveyor.
At 9 o'clock Hon. C. F. Reavis, candi-
date for district judge, was intro-
duced, and spoke for over an hour and
a half. He was listened to with the
closest attention. He took up the
charges made against him one by one
and effectually proved their falsity.
His speech was frequently interrupted
by applause. Mr. Reavis is an able
man and a brilliant speaker and the
meeting accomplished much good.
The Brownville band furnished ex-
cellent music during the meeting.

A. L. Lawrence has made a record
as sheriff of this county that he and the
republican party can point to with
pride. He has let no prisoner escape
and when the warrant for the arrest
of a person was placed in his hands he
has always found him and brought to
trial. During his term of office he has
had some of the most desperate crim-
inals in his charge that the county has
ever had. He has kept and landed
them safely in the pen. He has not
been an expensive official as many
have been, especially is this true of
the jury that he summoned for the second
Goldsberry trial.

The first trial was so noted that
nearly every one knew of it, before
summoning a man Sheriff Lawrence
would ask him if he knew anything
about the case and if he did he was
not summoned. By this method only
about one in eight were summoned,
and the jury fees and the mileage of
the other seven who could not qualify
when called were saved the county.
Such a man is a valuable officer and
should be retained in office.—Post

C. O. Snow says in his campaign
that he is running on the record he
made as county clerk, and the cards
that he gives out contains some figures
that need a little investigating. Ac-
cording to his card the fees of the of-
fice during his best year are \$382.69
more than the fees of the office under
Mr. Hacker. (No clerk can control the
fees of his office.) Did Mr. Snow
return \$382.69 to the county treasury?
No, he only returned \$157.29, the bal-
ance, \$225.40, had to be paid out for
extra help.

Voter, is it not rather expensive to
pay out \$225.40 to do \$382.69 worth of
business, when the present clerk, Mr.
Hacker, will do it for nothing? He
has done the work of the office for
\$2200 and will do it again for the same
amount no matter what the receipts
may be. It will not be necessary to
pay him \$225.40 to collect \$157.29 for
the county.—Post.

The senior editor went to Lincoln
Monday evening to attend a meeting
of the postmasters of the state held in
that city Tuesday. About 850 post-
masters were present from all parts of
the state, and all had a royal good
time. A permanent organization was
effected, but it is safe to predict that
there will be no strike or walkout, nor
increase in the price of stamps or post-
al cards. The postmaster returned
home Wednesday.

The Auburn Herald, the fusion or-
gan, is still horrified at the idea of the
republicans choosing W. M. Crichton
as their candidate for county judge.
The Herald cannot deny that Mr.
Crichton has the education and ability
to make a good judge, but to show his
unfitness for the position says: "Why
he used to vote with us and we elected
him to office twice,"—as if that fully
and finally fixed it that he was an un-
fit man for office. But the voters will
decide that Mr. Crichton will make a
good judge and he will be elected
next Tuesday.

C. O. Snow had to have extra help
in 1900 to properly conduct the busi-
ness of the office of the county clerk,
and the county had to pay \$349.80 for
such additional help. In 1901 the
county had to pay \$225.40 for addition-
al for Mr. Snow, making a total of
\$575 paid in the two years Mr. Snow
was clerk for help; in addition to the
deputy. Mr. Hacker has kept up the
business fully as well as did Mr. Snow
and it has not cost the county one
cent for additional help. Mr. Snow
acknowledges that Mr. Hacker con-
ducted the work of the office as well
as he could himself, and Mr. Hacker
has saved the county the \$575 in cash
for additional help the two years Snow
was clerk.

people that he can do the work of the
office for \$2200 and he is perfectly
willing to do it for the next two years
at the same price, and it is simply a
matter of economy to the county to let
him remain there.—Post.
