W. H. McIninch, one of Nemaha county's pioneer citizens, after a residence of forty-five years on one farm, is now numbered with Auburn's population. This year he had a handsome cottage erected in the western part of the second ward and he and his wife and daughter are now comfortably installed therein. It is the first move they have made in nearly half a century, and is one of the notable events in the family history. Their new home is handsomely furnished throughout. All they brought with them from the farm was their clothing and a few family relics.—Auburn Herald.

Electrician Elliott of the Auburn Telephone exchange is a very busy man at the present time. He is now engaged in installing the new switchboard and when the work is completed Auburn will have the most complete and extensive local exchange of any city of its class in the state. The new board will have an immediate capacity of 525 'phones and an ultimate capacity of 1,000. One of the most appreciable of the new board over the old one will be the fact that it is equipped with a transfer board. The drops are on four cabinets with 135 drops to the cabinet. The work of installing the new board will not be completed within two weeks. There are now three operators employed at the central office and as soon as the new board is put on an additional operator will be engaged. The capacity of the present switchboard is tested to the utmost and there are a number of persons who are waiting an enlargement of the facilities in order to become connected with the service.—Auburn Herald.

The district court of this county has been called upon to unravel one of the most peculiar matrimonial tangles that has ever occurred in this section of the state.

This week Judge Lambert filed with the clerk of the court a petition praying for the annulment of the marriage of David T. Thomas who is now living with his son, John Thomas, in Aspinwall precinct, from Elizabeth Jones, known as Thomas, and whose home is in Stella, Richardson county.

The story related in the petition is as strange as a tale of fiction. About thirty years ago Elizabeth Jones was married to a man named James Jones, in the vicinity of Pittsburg, Pa. After living with him a month or so, it is alleged that she found that her matrimonial venture did not promise happiness as she anticipated, so she left him.

She came west with a preacher named John T. Thomas and located in Aspinwall precinct. The preacher introduced her to David Thomas and it was through the minister's ability as a match maker that the woman became engaged to David Thomas and married him. It is alleged that it was represented to Mr. Thomas that Mrs. Jones was a widow.

After living on the farm in Aspinwall precinct for a number of years the couple decided to retire and they moved to Stella. It is alleged that the woman made life so uncomfortable for Mr. Thomas that he was forced to leave his home and go to live with his son on the farm.

In the meantime Thomas learned that James Jones, the first husband of the woman, was still living. It is alleged that the latter was injured some years ago in a railroad accident and lost both his legs. His life seems to have been a varied one for he wrote a book on his experiences and is going through the country selling it. He makes his home at various times at Iola and Emporia, Kansas, and at Youngtown, Ohio.

A boy, now twenty years of age, named Edwin Thomas, was the result of the union of David Thomas and the defendant in the case.—Auburn Herald.

Strong opposition is being encountered in Lincoln against the acceptance of John D. Rockefeller's gift in the University of Nebraska. Mr. Rockefeller's gift amounted to \$66,666, this sum to be used for the erection of a temple for religious instruction in the university. The deed of gift provides that \$33,333 must be added by popular subscription. A year was allowed to raise the latter fund, but an extension was granted because of the inability of the local committee to raise the money.—Ex.

The Missouri river blocked yesterday afternoon just opposite the pumping station of the water company. The river is very narrow at this point and therefore when the ice began to run heavy it commenced to clog, and it was not long in blocking. It can be seen from a table published in another column what the river has been doing for many years past. There are many interesting things to be learned from this table, and it used to be of more interest in years past than now, for the reason we were then without the bridge, and had to depend on a boat being able to cross. After the river blocked then the people crossed on the ice or in a channel that was cut for a boat. Some winters a channel was kept open all the time and the cars were transferred via the big boats that were kept here the year round. In the early days the crossing was made only on the ferry boat or in a skiff. If they were tied up then you had to wait until the river became so they could be used. Things are now different, for we have a bridge and the opening or closing stage of the river cuts no figure.—Neb. City News.
