## The Auburn Banquet

A banquet was given at the Hotel Byers, Auburn, Saturday night, Dec. 19, by the Nemaha county bar, to Judge S. Stull in honor of his retirement, to Judge-elect Kelligar, in honor of his assension to office, to B. Frank Neal, in honor of her departure, and to the out-going and in-going county officers.

After the banquet W. H. Kelligar spoke of the splendid official character of Judge Stull and of his intellectuality and fairness.

G. W. Cornell was next on the program and he responded in the same happy vein. After giving some of his experiences and making some witty allusions he read the following set of resolutions which had been adopted by the members of the bar association: "Whereas, [Our honored fellow citizen and fellow townsman, a member of our bar, the Hon. John S. Stull, has been twice chosen by the electors of this judicial district to serve as judge thereof, and has presided as judge for a term of eight years last past with fairness, patience, and kindness, and has preserved the dignity and integrity of the bench:

Whereas, Said John S. Stull is personally and well-known to the members of this bar as an honest and upright judge, whose personal character is above reproach; and

"Whereas, his term of office will soon expire and he will resume the practice of law and be one among us as a practicing lawyer and a member of our bar, therefore be it

"Resolved, That it is the sense of the members of the Auburn bar, that we will take this occasion to express our appreciation of the fairness and kindness shown us, as practicing lawyers, by the said John S. Stull as presiding judge of the courts of this district,

"That we take pleasure in making it publicly known, that we do not hesitate to give expressions of commendation and words of praise of those who faithfully discharge the duties of a public trust. And be it further

"Resolved, That the members of the Auburn bar join with the lawyers of this district, and with the public in general, in the opinion, that Judge Stull has graced the bench with fairness and ability and faithfully discharged the duties of the high office with which he has been entrusted.

"And we welcome him back to his old time membership of our bar, as a practicing lawyer, and promise him a warm time
