Here are the pointers that should be born in mind by rural free delivery patrons:

Do not forget that—Every letter mailed on a route requires two cents postage—one cent is not enough.

Written matter of any kind, whether in sealed or unsealed envelopes must have a two-cent stamp

No one has a right to open or even touch any other mail box than his own. Instances have been known where notes have been placed in people's boxes unstamped. This is strictly forbidden by law and is subject to a heavy penalty.

You have no right to place a letter, stamped or unstamped, in any one's mail box and are liable to be arrested at any time for doing so.

While you have a right to keep your boxes locked if you choose, it is an unnecessary precaution, and one that adds much trouble to the carrier, more particularly in cold weather.

Patrons should keep well supplied with stamps—the carriers have them for sale—do not compel the carrier to fish around in a box for loose pennies.
