INTERVENTION IN THE WAR HAZ-ARDOUS UNDERTAKING.

Dare Not Hope for Physical Assistance From United States in Behalf of Japan, and Cannot Go Alone,

LONDON.-Henry Norman, in a long letter to the Times this morn-Ing, ela orates the views he expressed in an interview Tuesday last national attempt to step in between Cuba with his family. Japan and Russia seemed to him to be outside the range of rational surmise, and that he would be very much surprised indeed if King Edward had said or done anything which would give rise to such a rumor as that which stated that the king bad undertaken to mediate between the compatants.

Mr. Norman thinks that Japan may have counted on initial victories and then on inducing the powers to intervene, and that such calculaton on the part of Japan may produce a delicate and perilous situation, because it is impossible for Russia to accept defeat or countenance intervention in any form while she has a single rouble or soldier left.

Whatever happens, says Mr. Norman, whether Japan be victorious or defeated, it is certain that Great Britain and the United States will be expected to take the lead in proposing or enforcing intervention, and since it is impossible to suppose that the United States would join Great Britain in military operations for the purpose of coercing Russia while France and Germany are friendly to Russia, it would be madness for Great Britain thus isolated, to attempt forcible intervention.
