The committee will go over the route Friday on a tour of inspection and intend to employ an engineer in a short time. The committee consist of J. W. Lash, James Taylor, Emile Berlet, J. C. Deuser, D. A. Meese.—Herald.

While it is being stated that the new revenue law was enacted in the interest of the railroads and against the farmers it is well to look up the records.

The Nebraska railroad along the Missouri river in this county was assessed in 1903 at \$4,000 per mile. This year the same line was assessed at \$8,000.

The Republican Valley line was assessed in 1903 at \$4,500 and this year at \$10,000 per mile.

The main line of the M. P. in this county was assessed in 1903 at \$6,000; this year at \$8,400.

The Weeping Water line was assessed in 1903 at \$4,600 and this year at \$8,000.—Granger.

Last week a petition was presented to the board of county commissioners signed by forty-one leading taxpayers, protesting against the five percent raise made by the state board of equalization. The board appointed the following committee to look after the matter: R. G. Wilkinson, S. Reed, J. W. Lash, S. W. McGrew, J. M. Armstrong, Church Huwe, J. W. Kerns. The committee and engaged Ed Ferneau and H. A. Lambert as counsel.

Thursday Judge Stull filed a protest against the action of the commissioners appointing a committee and giving financial aid to the prosecution and an injunction restraining the county clerk from adding the five per cent to the taxes, and a temporary injunction has been granted.

Sunday night when J. W. Taylor closed his drug store, he left a lamp burning in the back room and started for Shubert. It was replaced at once as soon as the fire was out. The loss was about \$300 and was covered by insurance.—Falls City Journal.
