For several weeks Hon. H. R. Howe has been earnestly engaged in the laudable effort of inducing the republican congressional committee for the First district of Nebraska to name Auburn as the place in which to hold the next convention, that will undoubtedly witness the most interesting political fight ever pulled off in the state of Nebraska.

It is thought that five votes will be cast in favor of Auburn when the question comes up in the committee which will probably meet in Lincoln a week from Monday, April 24th. As there are but seven votes in the committee four would carry the point.

The candidates from the smaller counties realize that it would not give any added prestige to their cause to hold the convention at Lincoln, where the Lancaster county machine and its gang of railroad cappers and wire pullers would be right at home and could bring a big influence to bear on the question of who will be the nominee.

Auburn, so far as every facility of transportation or accommodation is concerned, is second only to Lincoln. The B. & M. and Mo. Pac. railroads make ingress and egress easy, while her two big hotels and a large number of small ones solves the questions of eating and sleeping.

Lancaster county is bending every energy and using every argument possible to bring the convention to Lincoln and it will be a gratifying victory to the smaller counties to see Auburn capture it.—Republican.
