In the weekly crop bulletin issued Tuesday Mr. Loveland says:

"The past week has been cold, the mean daily temperature averaging 4 degrees below normal. Frost occurred on several days with minimum temperatures between 20 and 25 degrees in western counties and between 30 and 35 degrees in eastern

"The rain fall was above the normal in nearly all parts of the state. It exceeded 2 inches in central counties and decreased to about half an inch in the counties along both the northern and southern borders of the state.

"The low temperature of the past week has been unfavorable for the growth of vegetation. Winter wheat continues in excellent condition. Oats were frozen to the ground in some western counties. Generally, however, oats and spring wheat are up nicely and the damage from low temperature is slight. Grass has grown very slowly. Plowing for corn has progressed nicely but it has been too cold for planting. The frost injured plums and other early fruit somewhat."

SCHOOL NOTES
You are what you are and no one can make you otherwise.

County Superintendent Carrington paid us a flying visit last Thursday. He entertained us with some of his stories and finally finished with one of Riley's poems which was, as they always are, very much enjoyed.

The American people are peculiarly a wasteful people. They are a people given to doing great things and in consequence, often letting the little things go. They begin by wasting time in school and end by wasting life itself.

The Nemaha teachers were all present at the association at Auburn Saturday. They have made a good record in the association attendance having attended every one held in the county this year. The one at Auburn was well attended there being in all eighty-three teachers present, sixty-eight of whom were those from outside of Auburn.

There are those who pretend to be gentlemen yet who will not speak or show the slightest courtesy to one who has offended them in some slight way. Is there none of chivalric spirit left with us today? Are we as a nation going to degenerate to such a plane? If we cannot but feel unkindly toward some one else let us at least not place others in an embarrassing situation by our conduct.

The teachers of Nemaha receive an average salary of \$36 1/2 per month. Each does the work of between three and four grades yet there are those who think notwithstanding these conditions the teachers of Nemaha ought to do work as thoroughly as it is done in Lincoln or some other large place where the teachers receive an average salary of fifty or sixty dollars a month and have only one or a part of a grade to teach. That teacher who doesn't earn forty dollars per month ought never to be allowed to teach. But price is no item in reckoning with a school teacher. Most teachers expect very little remuneration and most boards offer very little. Who after all is to blame?

Prof. R. A. Moore, of the Wisconsin Experiment Station, writing on the subject of barley, gave a little advice in last week's Homestead which might be heeded with profit by many of our readers. He points out its uses as a food for live stock, especially hogs, and calls attention to the fact that throughout a large part of the corn belt more pounds of barley on an average can be raised per acre than of any of the other grains. He expressed the idea that the growing of barley will to a large extent solve the difficult problem of getting a catch of clover, as it is an almost ideal nurse crop. 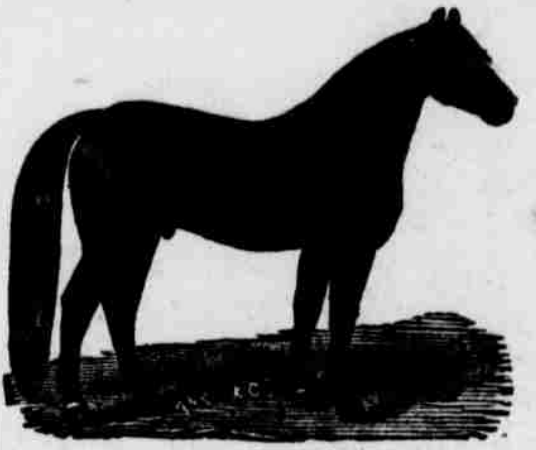
