## DEATH OF MRS. MALINDA SKEEN

A telegram received Wednesday morning by C. W. Roberts gave the sad news of the death of Mrs. Roberts' mother, Mrs. Malvina Skeen, at the home of her son, A. J. Skeen, in Waubesa county, Kansas. Mrs. Roberts and her brother, Ben T. Skeen, went to see their mother Wednesday of last week and expected to bring her back home with them, if she could stand the trip, as she was very anxious to come back to her old home to die, but she was not able to start.

Mrs. Skeen was one of the first settlers of Nemaha county, coming here with her husband, John G. Skeen, in the fall of 1855. The first Methodist society in this part of the state was organized in their home, a small log cabin. Their claim was the fourth entered in Nebraska at the Omaha land office. Mr. Skeen passed away a few years ago. The deceased leaves three children to mourn the loss of a loving mother—Andrew J. Skeen of Waubesa county, Kansas, Benjamin T. Skeen and Mrs. Jennie Roberts, both of Nemaha county.

The funeral services will be held at the Cumberland Presbyterian brick church three miles northeast of Nemaha Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The relatives started Thursday with the body and will arrive at Auburn over the M. P. at 2 o'clock this afternoon. It is expected the services will be conducted by Rev. D. B. Lake. The interment will take place in the Nemaha cemetery.

Mrs. Skeen was aged 90 years, 4 months and 15 days.

Rumor has it that Auburn is soon to have another railroad. Recent developments brought to light would signify that recent surveys made by civil engineers, supposed to be in the employ of the Missouri Pacific road, are really of another road and are prospecting in view of establishing an electric line to connect this city with Nebraska City and Omaha with terminal at Howe. The Gypay tribe, which passed through the city two weeks ago and reported to be on their way to Chicago to meet their empress, were, in fact, a part of the movement for the new line. This also give grounds for the changes to be made in the Omaha Auburn local, thus discontinuing Daisy Dean's train, as the Missouri Pacific people realize that the interurban would demoralize their business. Just at present all trains stop to take water here.—Republican.

The Lincoln News, in commenting on the approaching congressional convention at Falls City, has the following to say:

Tom Majors is the father of a plan of action designed to defeat the aspirations of the Lancaster county congressional candidate, by pooling the six other counties of the district and allowing the six candidates to draw slips from a hat, thereby determining which one is to have the nomination.

According to his scheme Nemaha, Pawnee, Johnson, Richardson, Cass, and Otoe counties are to enter into an agreement before the convention. Then in a trice, before the session begins, the slips containing the names of the candidates would be shuffled in a hat, and the name of the successful individual man would be drawn. The drawbacks in the way of this scheme are that Otoe and Cass counties, as determining factors in the convention, are talking of a pool between the two which would give them the balance of power and that such a scheme could not control the action of delegates.

Majors says that he is not a candidate, and that Nemaha county will go to an Auburn man named Neal, a young attorney. Politicians from that section of the state suggest that Majors is backing this proposed combination in the hope that he may be permitted to name the postmasters in Nemaha county. It is said that he made an offer of that kind to Congressman Burkett when the latter was a candidate the first time.

It is not believed that the pooling scheme will accomplish a great deal, although, because of the fact that it is the forlorn hope for the candidates in the smaller counties who have such slight prospects that they would be better off with one chance out of six, it may find greater favor than anticipated, but those who really hope to win are not likely to leave it entirely to chance.

The latest advices from Pawnee county are to the effect that Wilson will have a delegation which he can control, although numerous reports which have been circulated made it appear that it was given him as trading stock in the interests of Burlington candidates.

Majors is rather secretive in regard to the scheme. He rather intimated that he was not entirely hopeful for the adoption of the plan, although he said that is the only way in which to take the nomination away from Lancaster county, which because of its preponderance has a practical certainty of getting the plum in any convention in which the smaller counties are not absolutely united.

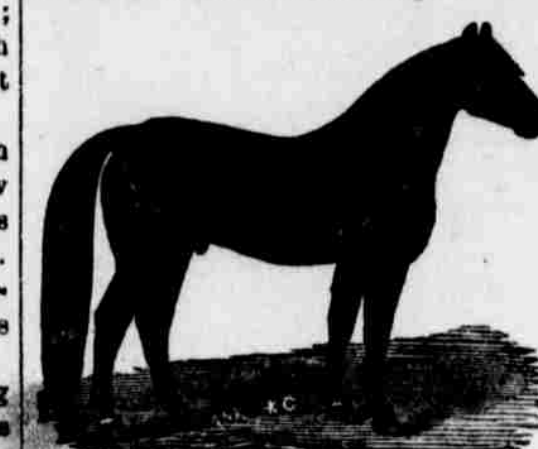
