Ernest M Pollard is elected congressman from the First district, to succeed E. J. Burkett, by a majority of about 2750 over F. W. Brown, the democratic candidate. The following are the majorities for Pollard, who carried every county in the district: Lancaster 1350; Pawnee, 455; Richardson, 277; Nemaha, 187; Johnson, 235; Otoe, 40; Cass, 204. The vote was very light all over the district probably less than half the regular vote being cast.

**Another Fire at the Titus Nursery**

The barn at the Titus Nursery was burned to the ground Wednesday. The fire was discovered about 11 o'clock, and the entire hay loft was then blazing. All that could be done was to keep the fire from spreading to other buildings. They phoned to Nemaha for help and in a very short time a bucket brigade was present. It took hard work to keep the fire from spreading, as there were other buildings, hay stacks, etc., in a short distance. About two tons of hay were in the loft. This was dragged around so it would burn out as fast as possible. On account of the extreme hot weather, fighting the fire was very hard work.

The barn was 25x32 feet and was worth probably \$500 or \$600. A set of double harness, set of single harness and single fly nets were also burned. No live stock was in the barn.

How the fire started is a mystery. Joe Titus had been in the barn about a half hour previous and his mother just afterward, but no signs of fire were noticed. This is the second fire within five weeks, the packing shed and office having burned the night of June 15.

August is a closed month that none who pretend be hunting ordinary game birds may have an excuse for killing young prairie chicken and all persons found hunting and shooting in August are to be prosecuted by the fish and game department.
