The republican county convention met at the court house in Auburn Monday. J. M. Anderson was elected temporary chairman and W. H. Bousfield and W. W. Sanders temporary secretaries.

The credentials handed in showed every precinct represented except Island and West Benton.

The temporary organization was made permanent and the convention proceeded to nominate a ticket in the order of the call.

D. J. A. Dirks was renominated for treasurer by acclamation.

For county clerk an informal ballot was taken. J. M. Wright, the present deputy, received a majority of the votes cast, and a motion to make the ballot formal was carried and Mr. Wright was declared nominated.

Fred Rohrs received a majority of the votes for sheriff on the first ballot and was declared nominated.

M. S. McIninch was nominated for judge by acclamation.

Geo. D. Carrington, jr., was renominated for county superintendent by acclamation.

For coroner there were three nominations—Dr. V. M. Boal and Dr. Raynor of Auburn and Dr. H. C. Smith of Brownville. On the third ballot Dr. Smith was nominated.

Chas. R. Hacker was nominated for surveyor against his protests, but he finally consented to accept if elected.

W. A. Doolittle was renominated for county commissioner.

A motion was adopted empowering the county central committee to fill all vacancies on the ticket should any occur.

Resolutions were adopted endorsing President Roosevelt, Congressmanillard and the Falls City platform.

The following delegates were elected to the state convention: T. J. Majors, Ellis E. Good, Richard F. Neal, J. W. Kerns, C. R. Hacker, Peter Berlet, R. M. Crichton, J. W. Bailey, S. W. Christy, Lee Shubert, W. S. Russell, Geo. H. Sutton, Peter Berger, C. A. Curtis, John A. Aumiller, Ed Shurtleff, H. H. Studheit.
