Zinc Ore Found Near Nemaha

In digging for coal on his farm one mile south of Nemaha A. R. McCandless found specimens of mineral, and Dr. Frazier, who has lived several years in the zinc mines of southwestern Missouri, pronounces some of them zinc. Of course it is not known how much zinc there is, and whether it will pay to mine or not. This can only be told by digging. Dr. Frazier says if he found as good indications of zinc in southwestern Missouri he would think he had struck a rich mine. Nemaha may yet be the center of a mining district. Mr. McCandless is going to spend some money experimenting, and we hope he will strike it rich. It will be a big thing for this part of the country if he strikes a good coal or zinc mine.

Mrs. Minnie Hoover, wife of Frederick E. Hoover, died at her home six miles southwest of Nemaha on Tuesday, Nov. 21, 1905, at 2 o'clock a. m. aged 39 years, 1 month and 14 days.

The deceased has suffered for several years with consumption, and though everything was done for her relief that a loving husband and skilled physicians could do, she steadily failed. She was bedfast but a few days before her death.

The funeral services were held at the Methodist church at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. The church was crowded with sympathizing friends. Rev. C. L. Meyers of Auburn preached the sermon. A large number of friends followed the remains to the Nemaha cemetery.

Mrs. Hoover leaves a husband and five children, a son and four daughters, who will sadly miss the loving care of a wife and mother.

The bereaved husband and children have our heartfelt sympathy in their great sorrow.
