## Pith of the President's Message to Congress

Alaska should be given an elective delegate to congress and government aid for a railroad to the Yukon river.

Special plea for appropriations for maneuvers of army and continued expansion of navy.

Calls attention to the necessity for legislation to reach breaches of trust in the public service, where officers act corruptly without consideration of money value.

Results of inquiries demand more modern and businesslike methods in department administration; congress should provide rearrangement of department duties.

Publicity of all campaign contributions and prohibition of contributions by corporations is demanded.

Urges paramount importance of principle of treating a man on his worth as a man rather than his social position, occupation or class.

Wants authority for Department of Commerce and Labor to investigate general conditions governing labor of women and children.

Wants Chinese coolies barred but more liberal treatment of merchant, students and educated classes.

Defends civil service principles and asserts civil service law is being energetically and impartially enforced.

Declares copyright laws urgently need revision.

Insists on holding every big corporation responsible and accountable to the government to insure healthy social and industrial life.

Asks revision of criminal law of United States.

Element of elasticity is necessary in our monetary system by provision insuring larger volume of money during fall and winter months.

Unnecessary offices should be abolished, but growth of the nation makes inevitable and legitimate increase in the number of officials

Renews recommendation for a wise law applicable to District of Columbia and all industries within federal jurisdiction.

Recommends law to regulate interstate commerce in misbranded and adulterated food, drinks and drugs.

Asks congress to forbid licensing of gambling in territories.

Outlines part taken by United States in inviting the powers to join in another peace conference and reviews peace negotiations between Russia and Japan.

Asks immediate steps for the fortification of Hawaii and precautions against creation of special classes in those islands.

Calls attention to necessity of legislative limitations on excessive hours of labor on railroads.

Restrictions should rest upon the character of the immigrant, without regard to religion or race, by inspection of would-be immigrants at ports of embarkation.

Perplexing problems of Indian citizenship and need for more Indian schools and field matron service for Indian women.

Opposes depriving the courts of injunction powers, but recommends regulation of procedure to prevent exparte action.

Urges more liberal treatment of the question of franchisees in our island possessions with a view to developing resources more quickly.

Recommends careful consideration whether Bureau of Corporations cannot be extended to govern interstate transactions in insurance both fraternal and benevolent societies, as well as old line.

Commends favorable consideration for further assistance.

Urges national capital be made a model city in all respects as regards parks, play grounds, sanitary dwellings, education, truancy, charities and factory regulations.

Desirability of giving members of life saving service pensions similar to firemen and policemen in our cities.

Asks earnest consideration of the report of Merchant Marine commission.

Wants government work extended.

Monroe doctrine is held up as one of the most effective instruments for peace, to maintain which we are committed.

Commission to revise naturalization laws in the direction of greater stringency endorsed.

Reviews canal history; only unsettled point is whether canal be sea level or lock canal; on this point awaits

findings of advisory board of engineers Advocates American citizenship for Porto Ricans.

Calls attention to the great prosperity the people of this country continue to enjoy and emphasizes the fact that taken as a whole we must all go up or down together.

Calls attention to unsatisfactory condition of public land laws with reference to monopolizing public lands, to the operation of the reclamation act and classification of public grazing lands, and forest preservation.

Praises work of pension bureau and suggests nation care for confederate graves.

Philippine situation reviewed with various recommendations.

Repeats recommendation for rate regulating power in Interstate Commerce commission; the maximum or minimum rate fixed by the commission after hearing it to go into effect at once subject to review by the courts; private car lines, industrial roads, refrigerating and elevating charges to be likewise put under public supervision

Stability rather than ideal of perfection needed in raising revenue; admonishes that last year's deficit requires expenditures be kept within revenues or revenue laws readjusted.

Recommends legislation requiring use of block signals on all railroads and government inspection service to give effective enforcement.

Entire situation in Santo Domingo reviewed critically and our obligation under treaty to help straighten finances explained.

Asks help in abating smoke nuisance in the District of Columbia by more stringent legislation.

Asks more adequate financial provision for work of State department, both at home and abroad.

Recommends admission of two new states—one composed of Indian Territory and Oklahoma, and another of New Mexico and Arizona.—Omaha Bee.
