Miss Marie Hoover of New York city, formerly of Lincoln, was guest of honor at a pleasant party the first of the week, given by one of her friends in honor of her birthday anniversary. Mr. Chas Anderson, of this city, has in his possession and under chemical analysis some specimens of ore taken from the new "dud" lately made by A. R. McCandless on his farm just south of Nemaha.

To any one versed in geology or mining these specimens are very interesting, showing as they do the presence of zinc and silver galena, though it may be said, being lead, carrying with it traces of silver.

Mr. Anderson has several fine specimens which show clearly to the eye the presence of these minerals. There is found in what is known in mining parlance as "pockets," and these "pockets" usually denote in mineralogy that there is a regular ore bearing ledge at varying depths diagonally below. If the rule holds good in this instance Mr. McCandless may well feel interested.

The bluffs along the Missouri river in Nemaha county have never been thoroughly prospected, but in the slate or new shale, of which they are partially composed have been found promising signs of coal, and what is termed "fault," or coal which is not ripe as yet, even after the long ages of its preparation.

The clay which also enters into the structure of these bluffs, is very rich in aluminum and when the time arrives, some practical man will make use of the product awaiting him and incidentally make a fortune.

Farther south in Richardson county Dr. Gandy, of Humboldt, who owns some four thousand acres of land in the neighborhood of Barada, has become interested in the signs which denote the presence of oil under ground on his property. Oil experts have assured the doctor that the greasy product was there and being approached by a drilling company, agreed to lease the land if they would agree to bore at least five prospect holes on the property. This they refused to do and the doctor is now making preparations to sink a hole on this land on his own account.

The result will be watched with interest, for if there is oil at Barada, it should also be among the hills of western St. Deroin and eastern Aspinwall precincts in this county, as the configuration of the land is practically the same. —Herald

AUBURN, Neb., Dec. 25.—Last night at a luncheon given by Mrs. A. C. Mutz, she announced the engagement of her niece, Miss Mable Majors to Mr. Lester Armstrong. Miss Majors is also a niece of Hon. Tom Majors of Peru, and is one of the teachers in the Antioch school of this city. Mr. Armstrong is a young business man of South Auburn, being connected with the Gilmore-Armstrong Mercantile Co. The wedding will take place Jan. 1, 1906.

The board of Chautauqua managers has decided that the 1906 assembly at this place shall be held on August 11, to August 19. The major part of the program has already been prepared and the more important entertainers and features engaged.

An old fashioned spelling contest will be held in this city on January 20, 1906. Nine young persons will contest and the winner will receive a Webster's dictionary as a reward.

The trial of Charles Chamberlain, the ex-banker of Tecumseh, which was held in this city some weeks ago, will cost Johnson county the sum of \$510.40.

Nemaha's county apportionment from the state school fund this year is \$3,450.90.

Word reached here yesterday that P. G. Wheelton, a former resident of this city, was dying at Arapahoe, Ok. His son, Fred, left at once for his bedside. He is also the father of Edward Wheelton, station agent at Nemaha City, Henry Wheelton, a former cashier of one of the banks at Beatrice, and of L. D. Wheelton, who has been employed for a number of years in the government printing office in Washington, D. C., and of Mrs. James Roberts of this place.

When work was started on the "good roads" last fall, the Commercial club agreed to pay a certain amount of the expense. The cement road is to extend one and one-fourth miles across the Nemaha bottoms east of Auburn. Up to date \$6,900.43 have been paid out, the county expending \$3,652.70, and the Commercial club paying \$3,247.73, and the road is now where near completed.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 18.—Both of the Nebraska senators are pleased with their committee appointments. Senator Burkett landed on especially good committees and secured one of the best chairmanships to be handed out to the new members, that of Indian depredations. An interesting coincidence with this assignment is that Senator Homenway, the Nebraskan's former colleague in the house, was given sixth place on this committee. One of the most important committees of the senate is that dealing with the affairs of the District of Columbia. Mr. Burkett was assigned to the eighth place on this committee. He was also given sixth place in the committees on Pacific railroads and pensions. His other two assignments are on the committees of geological survey and woman suffrage.

Senator Millard was made chairman of inter-oceanic canals, and given assignments on the committees on corporations organized in the District of Columbia, standard weights and measures, audit and control of the contingent expenses of the senate and public buildings and grounds.

Representative Hinshaw today introduced a soldier's widow pension bill which will probably attract more than passing notice. It provides that a soldier's widow upon the due proof of legal widowhood, shall without further evidence or delay, be granted the same amount of pension which the soldier was drawing at the time of his death. Under the present law the chief difficulty that confronts the soldier's widow when she applies for a pension is the evidence in detail required to establish her net income and where it is close to the legal limits of \$250 frequently a special examiner is sent out and much delay and annoyance occur. This bill would entirely remove these objections. Mr. Hinshaw does not as yet know the prospects of the passage of his bill, but he expects to make a strong effort with the committee on pensions for favorable report, and hopes the house will pass the bill.
