R. V. Muir of Brownville has a column and a half article in this week's Granger in answer to a squib or two in The Advertiser two weeks ago. We will presume that Bro. Muir is honest in frequent statements that he believes all men belonging to church who do not vote the prohibition party ticket are hypocrites. Probably he looks back to the time before he became soured, when he belonged to church and voted one of the old tickets, and realizing that he was a hypocrite then (as he must have been according to his own statements) he thinks every other man must be. He accuses 98 per cent of the men belonging to church of being in this list. Only 2 per cent are good, and he is probably a little doubtful of the most of them. Several states have prohibition laws, but none of these were submitted to the vote of the people by party prohibition members of the legislature. Many more states have local option, and in some states from one-half to two-thirds of the counties are prohibition, but none of this was accomplished by the prohibition party. Nemaha has not had a saloon for 18 years, but this good result was not through the efforts of the prohibition party. When the prohibition amendment was submitted to a vote a few years ago over 70 per cent of the voters in Nemaha precinct cast their votes in favor of it, and there was not a party prohibitionist in the precinct. Nothing tangible has ever been accomplished in getting prohibition laws by the prohibition party. Everything that has been accomplished has been through non-partisan movements or through the old parties. Bro. Muir is not in favor of prohibition, evidently, unless he can get it through the prohibition party. We are in favor of getting prohibition the very quickest way possible, regardless of whether it is through a non-partisan movement or through any of the parties. But as a prominent prohibition party leader of the county told us, we do not believe Mr. Muir represents the prohibition party in his fierce denunciation. He is probably conscience stricken when he reflects what a hypocrite he used to be when he was a pillar in the church and a pillar in a whiskey party, and takes it out by denouncing the other fellow. There are others in the same boat.

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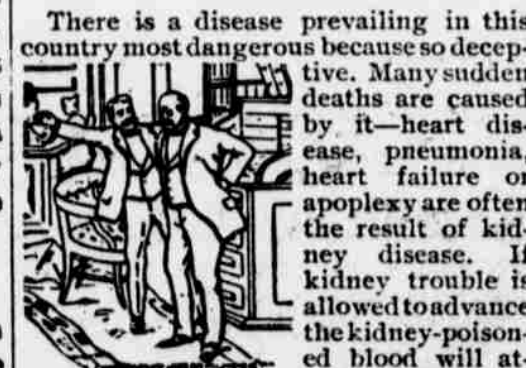
