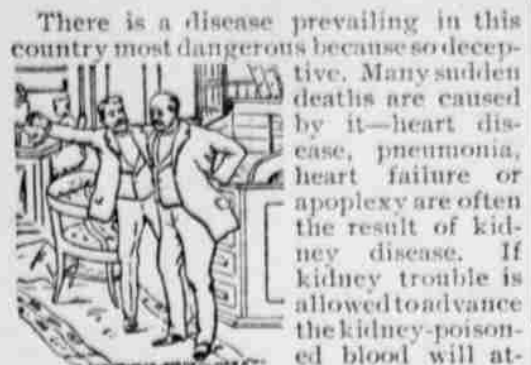

Last year they bought additional ground on the north and south of the cemetery, and also bought a strip of ground sixty feet wide from the section line north of the cemetery to that place, thus giving them a roadway. The section line road has been opened to this road, so no gates will have to be opened hereafter to get to the cemetery. For two years the grass has been kept mowed and old graves filled up, trees taken out, and other improvements made. We now have the best kept and best looking cemetery in this part of the state. The wife of Captain J. J. Mercer died at her home in Omaha Friday of last week, after a lingering illness. Mrs. Mercer was well known to all the older Brownville people, having lived there many years. She was the mother of ex-Congressman David H. Mercer. The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon.

The following items, taken from the Nemaha County Teacher, are of interest to school patrons and those interested in schools in this part of the county:

"Way down midst the woods and hills in Aspinwall precinct is a little school house in district number 58. I doubt if there is a happier place in the world. A real school is there. The children study and learn because of skillful leadership. Going to school is a delight for any one when that school furnishes a means and aid for natural development. (Miss Dora Morton is teacher.)

"Mr. Wm. F. Leslie,—McCandless school,—held 'patron's day' exercise Wednesday afternoon, Mar. 28th. A fine display of work was exhibited; a short program was well rendered but owing to the bad roads only a few patrons were present. The work of the teacher and the pupils is highly commendable.

"The 'Larkin' school has made commendable progress under the instruction of Mrs. Bernice Collin. I counted thirty-five names of this term's visitors on the register. Many schools are not visited by the people of the district. This does not necessarily mean that the patrons are not interested in the school but the teachers like to have the parents 'come in' and see their children's work. The attendance in this school is exceptional in its regularity.

"The 'Shockey' school is being taught by Mr. J. R. Reed, of Richardson county. He is a teacher of experience and a personality that holds children's undivided attention. The school has been rather unfortunate this year because of the change in teachers, but they are making up for lost time now.

"The school in Dist. No. 71,—'Rose field'—continues to progress under the instruction of Mr. Van Kirk Maxey. It is a large school. They have made wood collections and have the pieces named and mounted. Mr. Maxey keeps the capital and small letters written on the front black board. A box of soil in which wheat and beans are growing has a place in the room near the east window. The children are good singers.

"Miss Lulu Hickey maintains the same neat, tidy school room no matter how deep the mud. I came to her school, 'Champion,' about two o'clock Mar. 29. The children were studying quietly, every one had a neat clean appearance. The boys had their hair combed! Good recitations, a respectful attitude, and orderly methods characterize the school.

"Mr. G. E. Sanders is teaching 'Maple Grove' school, second year. The school property is fenced and a beautiful grove of maples stands in the northeast corner of the yard. Mr. Sanders is one of those earnest teachers who follow directions explicitly yet uses the highest degree of liberty in teaching. The children do excellent work. The eighth grade history recitation was one of the best I ever heard. Every student in the class made a full recitation on the topic assigned him (or her) covering every point intelligently. There is a difference between reciting by rote and telling what an author has to say about a subject. Before a class can do any good in studying history they must be able to read. We call the one who cannot read or write illiterate but I am persuaded that he who cannot read the meaning out of the printed page is illiterate. We are all more or less illiterate in this sense. Therefore give the child to read that which he can understand; his understanding will increase in proportion to the extent of his reading."
