The republicans of Nemaha county, Nebraska are hereby called to meet in convention in the court house in the city of Auburn on Monday, July 30, 1906, at the hour of 12 o'clock, noon, for the purpose of placing in nomination:

- Two representatives from the third district.
- One representative from the fifth district.
- One county attorney.
- One commissioner from the third commissioner district.
- And to select thirteen delegates to the state convention and sixteen delegates to the congressional convention.
- And to transact any other business that may properly come before the convention.

The basis of representation of the several precincts in the said convention shall be the votes cast for C. B. Letton for supreme judge at the general election, giving one delegate for each fifteen votes or major fraction thereof so cast for C. B. Letton

Said apportionment entitles the several precincts to the following representation in the said convention:

- Island, 1; Peru, 13; First Glen Rock 4; Second Glen Rock, 3; First Lafayette, 4; Second Lafayette, 4; First Washington, 2; Second Washington, 7; First Douglas, 9; Second Douglas, 11; Third Douglas, 9; London, 4; Brownville, 5; Nemaha, 7; Aspinwall, 4; Bedford, 5; West Benton, 4; East Benton, 3; St. Deroin, 1.

The date for holding the primaries is Saturday, July 28, and the hour for holding the same in the several precincts is as follows:

- Island, 7 to 9, Peru, 4 to 6, First Glen Rock 3 to 5, Second Glen Rock, 5 to 7, First Washington, 5 to 7, Second Washington, 4 to 6, First Lafayette, 4 to 6, Second Lafayette, 4 to 6, London, 6 to 8, Nemaha, 4 to 6, Aspinwall, 4 to 6, Bedford, 4 to 7, East Benton, 4 to 6, West Benton, 4 to 6, St. Deroin, 5 to 6.
