**ON THE SPIRE.**

Friends of James Freeman Clarke tell a story which may or may not have found its way into print. When he was a young man he visited Salisbury, England. To run up the scaffolding to the ball was easy. Then came the slightly more difficult climb to the foot of the cross over the bulging curve of the ball. A short platform gave him foothold. He reached up, put his hands on the base of the cross and pulled himself up. To gain the cross arm was merely "shinning" up a good-sized tree, and soon he stood on the horizontal timber, and reaching up, touched the top of the cross.

After enjoying his moment of exaltation, he slid to the foot of the cross, and with his arms round the post, slipped down over the great abdomen of the ball. His feet touched nothing. The little plank from which he had reached up was not there!

Here was a peril, and one for a cool head and sure eye. Of course he could not look down. The hugging hold that he had to keep on the bottom of the cross shortened the reach of his body, and made it less than when he had stood on the plank and reached up to the cross with his hands. **Gorillas in the Cameroons.**

Alfred Yorke, a young explorer who has spent more than two years in the French Congo and the German Cameroons, relates that during his travels in the latter territory he found a portion of the country entirely in possession of enormous gorillas standing six feet in height.
