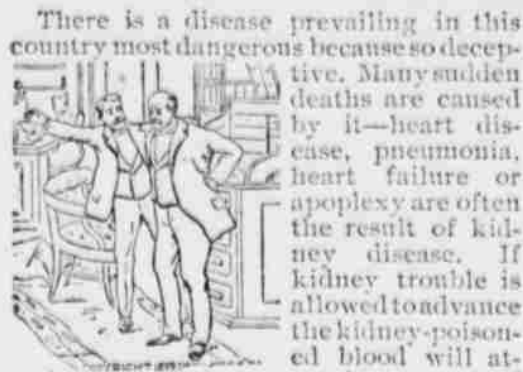

A Humboldt correspondent says: Dr. J. L. Gandy has been in Kansas City this week consulting with the commercial club of that place and the promoters of the new boat line between that point and St. Louis, his idea being to get the company to extend the service up the river to Nebraska points. He met with considerable encouragement, the promoters promising to extend the line as asked early next spring. If this is done it will mean much to the farmers of this region who will thus be accorded a much lower rate on grain shipments than is now possible by rail. The doctor owns several thousand acres of land along the Missouri river in the east end of this county and near Aspinwall and St. Deroin, and expects to furnish such ground as is needed for landing sites.

"Well, what are we voting for this fall," many of the voters ask. The time is drawing near when the answer to this question becomes very important. But in the light of existing conditions and universal prosperity the question answers itself. One thing we are voting to determine is whether or not we will maintain the industrial and financial conditions which have existed since the last democratic congress was turned out of power, or whether we will inject doubt and uncertainty into the continuance of these prosperous conditions by electing a democratic house?

If we vote to elect a republican house, it will mean that we are voting to continue the good work of the last session of congress and those which preceded it since 1896. If we vote to elect a democratic house, it means that we are voting to put an effectual stop to that work, to register a disapproval of it, and to prevent the carrying out of the principles and policies of the republican party which the people two years ago declared should continue to be the policy of the government for four years, or during the administration of President Roosevelt.

If we vote for a democratic house, and a democratic house should be elected, it does not mean that democratic principles and policies, whatever they may be, will become the principles and policies of the government. But it will mean that republican principles cannot be enforced during the next two years. With a democratic house the democrats cannot make any headway. They can, however, prevent the onward march of republicanism and universal prosperity. So then, the proposition resolves itself simply into the question, Whether the government shall "mark time" during the next two years, as Speaker Cannon puts it, or go forward along the lines already laid out and which have received the unqualified approval of the people?—Ex.
