The Nemaha County Historical society has been organized in Auburn. Constitution and by-laws have been adopted. The Herald says:

"The next meeting of the society was set for Thursday, January 31 at 7:30 p. m. at the court house when the organization will be perfected.

"The pioneer men and women of this county are cordially invited to join in the organization of a society that will be of social and historic interests and value to future generations.

"The constitution provides for precinct meetings which will be of special interest and benefit in each locality of the county. The early settlers are passing away

and much of the incident and history of early days is being thus lost to use.

"There are a great many men and women in all sections of the county, who have stories of rare incident and experience that would be of interest.

"It is just in this respect that this society is of such importance and prime value; the object of the organization being to promote a closer bond; a social and reminiscent union, and preserve in some form a portion of this rich fund of experience."
