### G. N. Titus Wins Premiums

At the meeting of the state horticultural society at Lincoln last week G. N. Titus carried off the lion's share of the premiums on apples. He got fourteen premiums in all—eight first and six seconds. One of the prizes won was the \$10 premium for best display of fifty plates of apples. R. W. Hesselstine of Peru carried off a number of premiums, getting next in number to Mr. Titus, and G. S. Christy of Johnson got some. In fact, these three men got considerably more than half the prizes. Mr. Titus got more than one-fourth of all premiums given.

### Nemaha County Coal

Nebraska coal—Nemaha county coal—is being shipped, sold and burned in Auburn homes today.

G. H. Hayes, one of the proprietors of the Honey Creek coal mine was in this city Wednesday, and placed the first car load from a Nebraska coal mine ever brought to this city.

The local dealers, being well stocked up, the product is being sold from the car. The coal is now in general use throughout the eastern portion of the county, being hauled regularly to Brownville, Peru, and many of the intermediate farms.—Herald.

The Auburn Republican last week published a statement of the amount of mail carried by the rural carriers from Auburn during the preceding three months. Auburn (the north side) has three routes. The amount of mail collected and delivered during the three months on route 1 was 17,033 pieces; on route 2, 11,687 pieces; and on route 3, 14,831 pieces.

Nemaha has two routes. The carrier on route No. 1 handled 17,680 pieces for the quarter—647 pieces more than either of the Auburn routes. Route No. 2 goes down in "the hills," which is not so thickly settled, and is a poorer part of the country. This route handled only 10,067 for the quarter. The two carriers handled a total of 27,747 pieces.

The wife of Dr. William Arnold, a former resident of Brownville but for a number of years living at Omaha, died at her home on Saturday, Jan. 12. Mrs. Arnold was a cousin of Salmon P. Chase, a member of Lincoln's cabinet and a former chief justice. She had many friends in this county who regret her death.
