### THAT NEW TRAIN

It Goes on March 3

A New Time Card Then

The Burlington road will issue a new time card soon, to go into effect on Sunday, March 3. At that time the new passenger train that has been talked of so much will be put on, making the first trip Monday, March 4. It will run from Falls City to Lincoln by way of Nemaha and Nebraska City going north in the morning and returning in the evening. It will run as a mixed train between Nemaha and Salem, as the freight now running between Nebraska City and Falls City will be discontinued. The freight from Beatrice will run to Nebraska City instead of stopping at Nemaha as heretofore. We will possibly be able to give time of new train next week. This will give Nemaha, Brownville and Peru four passenger trains daily, and will enable one to go to Lincoln, spend a few hours, and get back the same day.
