Their friends of the Christian Science church made up a party and gathered at their home and presented them with a beautiful bible. The presentation speech was made by W. L. Bousfield, and the gift was accepted by Mrs. Shook, in the absence of her husband, who is now in Kimball county. The balance of the evening was spent in social conversation. Refreshments were served. It is a matter of universal regret that Mr. and Mrs. Shook are leaving here. They have been residents of this community for many years and are loved and esteemed by all who know them. The loss of their citizenship by Nemaha county will be a distinct gain for Kimball county.—Auburn Republican.

W. E. Hoag this week announces his candidacy for the office of district clerk, subject to the decision of the republican electors at the primary election Sept. 3. Mr. Hoag practiced law for five years in this state, was admitted to practice in district and supreme courts, and is a practicing attorney today. Strange as it may seem, ninety-eight per cent of the territory and nearly eighty per cent of the population of Kentucky is under county prohibition. That state has a county option law, and ninety-one out of one hundred and nineteen counties have voted in favor of prohibition. The last one to do so was Harrison county which two weeks ago went prohibition by a majority of 1,600 votes. Cynthiana, the county seat, a town of about five thousand people was carried by the prohibitionists by forty-seven, although sixty days previous the town had gone "wet" by thirty-four votes.

A number of former citizens of old Brownville, who now reside in this city, held a meeting at Rainey's drug store, Monday night, to go over the proposed "Home Coming Day" to be held at Brownville. They decided that the best date that can be named for the event is August 29th, the anniversary of the founding of the historic old town. In the event that the Brownville people decide to hold the celebration the local contingent will take a band along and a goodly crowd will be present from Auburn. It is possible that arrangements will be perfected to send an invitation to every person who ever lived in Brownville and who is now alive and whose present address can be ascertained.—Auburn Republican.

"Homecoming" Day at Brownville.

On August 23, 1854, Richard Brown from Holt county, Missouri, crossed the river and landed at a little cove among the bluffs on the Nebraska Territory side. He was impressed with the beauty of the spot. As to whether he had dreams of founding a great city or a simple village, is unknown, but the fact remains that he drove stakes and laid out a town, Brownville grew and prospered until an aggregation of circumstances combined to her decline, which began in the latter 70's or early 80's.

On August 29, 1907, exactly fifty-three years after "old man Brown" drove his first claim stakes, there is to be held a "Homecoming Day" at the beautiful old town, ensconced among its shady hills. Invitations are to be sent throughout Nebraska and the union to all whose addresses are known who were once residents, or who were born in the historic old place. These invitations are to be printed and will be furnished by the committee free to all who have friends or relatives—once residents of Brownville—at a distance. In this manner it is proposed to give the greatest number possible knowledge of the affair and an opportunity to attend.—Auburn Herald.

The party prohibitionists claim to want prohibition, and probably a majority of them are really in earnest. But the leaders, or many of them, do not want it unless it comes through their party. Last fall one of the issues that was known would come before the Nebraska legislature for action was county option. The anti-saloon league, a non-partisan organization, endeavored to find out how candidates on old party tickets stood on this question, and supported the men who were in favor of this move. But the party prohibitionists, while publishing the report of the friendship of certain candidates for county option, fought them just as hard as they did those who were opposed to this action. Thus the candidates who were in favor of county option not only had the opposition of the saloon element and those believing in license, but also that of the people who claim to be the only prohibitionists. Consequently county option was defeated.

Many states now have county option, but it was obtained by the votes of legislators who were actively opposed by party prohibitionists. Prohibition in Kansas was submitted to the people by legislators who were opposed by this party. So has every advance in temperance legislation. And the prohibitionists have never accomplished anything, so far as legislation is concerned.

One of the members of that party in Nemaha last fall voted for members of the legislature on one of the old party tickets because he knew they would favor county option, and was denounced as a traitor and not a true prohibitionist for so doing.

Years ago, when we wanted to submit a prohibition amendment to the people, certain leading party prohibitionists came to the republicans and submitted a proposition that if we would nominate men who were known to be prohibitionists, and would put a plank in the county platform pledging these same men if elected to vote for the submission of the prohibition amendment, the prohibition party would support them. The proposition was accepted, strong prohibition workers nominated, and the plank put in platform as asked. The prohibitionists went square back on their pledge, nominated a ticket, and these same leaders stumped the county against the republicans, assisting in electing men who were known to be opposed to the amendment.

We believe prohibition is right, and we believe it will soon be achieved, but not by the prohibition party. The anti-saloon league is doing more to bring about prohibition than will ever be accomplished by the prohibition party. But the prohibition party says this league is wrong when it advocates working with old parties to achieve this result.

County Commissioner Cummings says the loss to the county by the washing out of the bridges by the heavy rain nearly three weeks ago is not so great as is generally thought. He estimates the real loss at about \$2,000 and then the county will have new bridges in place of some half worn. Many of the bridges were old ones and the commissioners had intended rebuilding them this year anyway. They are saved the work of tearing them out. Of course it causes much inconvenience to have them all go at once, especially as it is so hard to get men to do the necessary work of putting them in, but when they are in the county will be well supplied with good new bridges. The work is being pushed as fast as the men can be had.

A big hail story comes from Phelps county. After a terrific storm at midnight last Monday night, one man declares that he picked up hail stones in the morning that measured seven inches around. He lost 75 head of hogs and all his crops. The storm covered an area of eight miles wide and twenty miles long in which not a spear of anything was left standing.
