We see by the papers that Brownville is to have a "coming home day." There are a number of old time Brownville boys now living in Beatrice. Aaron Palmer was born up skunk hollow, near spiritual bend. "Gene" Stevens spent the best part of his life catching catfish and driftwood in the old Missouri. George Stevens was among the pioneers. George Arkwright fixed clocks for the natives in an early day, while S. Seaman sold merchandise to the people from across the river. The editor of this paper worked upon the old Nebraska Advertiser during the stirring days of the rebellion from 1862 to 1865. Brownville has a great deal of history that might be told around a camp fire of the pioneers. —Beatrice Sun.

### After the Coronership.

Dr. A. L. Asa, of Brownville, is a candidate for the nomination of coroner of Nemaha county, and is running for the office on the republican ticket. Dr. Asa married a Nemaha county girl, the daughter of R. C. Miller of Brock. He is well known in those parts of the county where he has lived. He is a clean, upright man, an ideal citizen in every way. His entire life has been spent in the county and judging the future from the past he would devote to the service of the county the very best that is in him. He is conscientious in his everyday life and would be the same in public service. 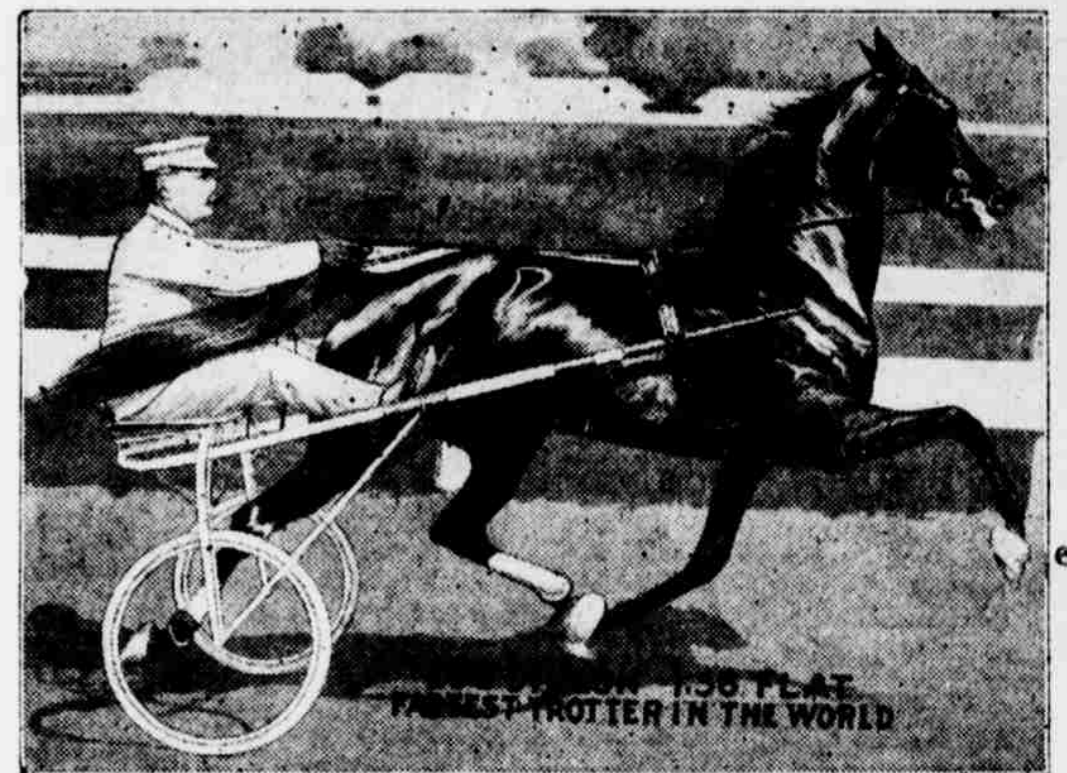
