## THE OLD SETTLERS PICNIC

It was a Great Success

The old settlers picnic, held last Friday, was probably the best ever held. It was an ideal day for the gathering—just cool enough to be comfortable. The attendance was no larger than at other times, but everybody appeared to be enjoying themselves. There were people here from all parts of the state and from Wyoming, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma. It was a great gathering of the pioneers and their descendants to the third and fourth generation.

Judge M. B. Reese made a fine speech in the forenoon, dwelling much on the early history of Nemaha and Nemaha county. It was good all the way through. In the afternoon Will M. Maupin of Bryan's Commoner made an excellent address that interested all who heard it.

The Hiawatha Military band of twenty-five pieces was the best band ever in Nemaha. The music given by them was fine, and they gave lots of it. They are certainly fine musicians. Before leaving in the evening they played for some time on the street, and were given three hearty cheers by the people. In turn they gave three cheers for the old settlers picnic and the people of Nemaha.

The trapeze performers and the vaudeville company entertained the crowd during the afternoon.

The base ball enthusiasts say they never had better entertainment in this line at any previous picnic. In the forenoon there was a game between the teams from Verdon and Thurman, Iowa, resulting in a victory for Verdon, the score being 5 to 3. The pitcher for the Indians pitched the full eighteen innings, with only a few minutes rest between games, struck out sixteen and passed one. He is a great pitcher for an amateur team. The Indians are all full blooded Indians.

The foot races were held down town after six o'clock and attracted a large crowd.

A. L. P. Thompson of this place, who is one of the heavy stockholders and directors of the Henry Field Seed Co., at Shenandoah, Iowa, has been up there this week attending the monthly directors meeting, and he gives us the following items regarding the new building:

The main building is to be absolutely fireproof, being constructed entirely of brick, concrete, steel and tile. No wood in it, whatever. Its size will be 60x105 and 41 feet high, three stories and basement. It has 132 large windows. Will be heated by steam. Electric power. It will take 1,200,000 pounds of crushed stone in the concrete, 325 yards of sand, and 5,200 bags of cement. Besides there will be 200,000 brick, and a carload of brick cement to lay them. Besides this there will be a frame corn house about the same size, built as an ell to the main building. The building is on a large lot in a splendid location. Sidetrack is already in. After the building is done the grounds will be finely improved and beautified. The seed business of this firm is among the largest in the west, and with their new building they will have a chance to still more expand their sales.

Passenger train 97, from the north, was two hours and a half late Thursday. There is a bad sink in the track north of Barney. Part of the track has been pushed to one side. The trains could not get over this part of the track Thursday morning, so passengers and train crews were exchanged by the north bound mixed train and the west bound passenger, the freight cars on the mixed train were left at Peru, and the newly made up train came on with the engine running backwards as far as Nemaha, where it was turned around on the "y." The sink has given trouble before. It is a bad one, and has sunk four or five feet this time, although the track was raised on Wednesday. There is a crevis each side of the track several inches wide at the top and extending down four or five feet. The track was blocked up Thursday so the afternoon train went through to the city.
